The Police patrol, who were out in Kenry on
Sunday night, reported to the Magistrates in
Petty Sessions at Pallas, that they perceived
three fires at a distance, towards the North-
West.
A threatening notice was on Sunday night
posted on an elm tree, in the demesne of Lord
Clarina, within four miles of this City, order-
ing several to give up their farms, and quit on
pain of death, or find their coffins.
A farm-house at Carnane, near Fedamore,
was burned on Saturday night last.
We received the following this morning from
our Newcastle Correspondent, dated yesterday:
"On Sunday night, a dairy-man, of the name
of Harnett, residing on the farm of Fauen, the
estate of Luke White, Esq. was most barbarously
beat, cut, and maimed, with a sword or scythe,
by the Rockites—his death is hourly expected.
Same night, a poor man, named Clovane, acting
under-driver to Mr. White's Agent, had his
house and every article therein consumed to
ashes, near these lands, supposed by the above
party. Several fires were seen on the same night,
in the neighbourhood of Listowel, County Kerry.
There is a house this moment on fire near Kil-
meedy. We perceive the flames from town."
Five stacks of barley and two stacks of oats,
contained in the yard of Tralee Castle, were
maliciously destroyed by fire on the night of
Sunday last.
On Friday night, four in-calf cows, the prop-
erty of Mr. Wall, Apothecary, of Doueraile,
were shot, and seven tons of hay burned near
that town. Mr. Wall was present when Surgeon
Chambers, 22d Regiment, amputated Hickie,
the insurgent's arm, which is supposed to be
the cause of such an outrage on his property.
On Thursday night a barn with corn in it was
maliciously burned at Coolhaween, near Cappo-
quin, County Waterford.
The following was found in the possession of
Francis M'Namara, who was convicted at Six-
mile-bridge, under the Insurrection Act, and
sentenced to seven years transportation. On
his detection, he endeavoured to swallow it.
After invoking the Trinity, the oath goes on:—

thought worthy of.
"At any of our Meetings I will not drink to intoxication,
so as to endanger myself to disclose of names regulations
