DEATHS.

At Davenport, County Meath, George Hand, Esq. On Wednesday last, died at an advanced age of 76 years, Mrs. O'Brien, widow of the late Christopher O'Brien, Esq. of Ennistown.

On Saturday night, at Cote, after a tedious illness, Captain Edward O'Brien Druce, of the Royal Navy. This amiable Gentleman eminently distinguished himself early in life, in the service of his country, particularly when a Lieutenant on board H. M. S. *Hydra*, at Born, on the Coast of California, on the 19th of October, 1808, when, with only fifty men opposed to above a Saut 4000 French and Spaniards, he stormed the Fort, spiked the guns, and succeeded in bringing off three small howitzers, for which gallant exploit he was afterwards promoted to the rank of Commander, and subsequently having brought home the dispatch relative to the burning of Moscow, to that of Post Captain.

The venerable, learned, and pious Doctor John Thomas Treay, Roman Catholic Archbishop of Dublin, died at his residence in Cavendish-row, on Saturday evening, after an illness of more than a year, in the 76th year of his age, and filled the Metropolitan See thirty-seven years. Doctor Treay was born in the City of Dublin, in July, 1753—appointed Bishop in December 1770, consecrated the following year, 1771, and translated to the Archbishopric of Dublin in 1780.

He possessed a serious, understanding, extensive information, and great talents. His private life was exclusively devoted to the duties of his sacred calling. He was aged 83 years, and ten months. As a mark of respect to his memory, it has been resolved that his funeral shall be a public one.
