other persons present, felt any fear whatever for
their personal safety. That there was a consi-
derable crowd on this, as on other occasions of
the sort, but no tumult or riot whatever took
place, nor is there the slightest reason for sup-
posing that the assemblage of persons were
brought together by any other motive than mere
curiosity, nor does He believe that there was
any political or religious feeling whatever
evinced on the occasion. The Dean further
expressed his indignation at being appealed to,
or in any way mentioned, in so improper and
mischievous a statement. And in justice to his
fellow-Citizens he also declared, that for four-
teen years that he has resided among them as
Dean of Limerick, he never experienced the
slightest interruption in the performance of any
religious duty at the Cathedral."

Yesterday, the Right Worshipful D. F. G.
Mahony, Mayor, held an Inquest on the body
of Darby Healy, who expired that morning at
six o'clock, at Thomond-gate. It appeared in
evidence, that he was seized with a fit at five
o'clock the evening before, when he fell and
was deprived of power to stir or speak, and con-
tinued in that state until his death---it also
appeared, that about three weeks ago, he was
affected with a violent fit. Verdict---"Died
by the Visitation of Almighty God."

Saturday last, Counsellor Blackburne, assisted
by Counsellor Holland and a Bench of Magis-
trates, held a Sessions in the County Court, when
James Kennedy, from the barony of Pubble
Brien, was tried for being idle and disorderly,
convicted and sentenced, under the Insurrection
Act, to seven years' transportation.

To-morrow Counsellor Blackburne proceeds
to hold a Sessions at Rathkeale, where the cases
of forty-four persons for breaches of the Insur-
rection Act are to be investigated.

be resumed here on Friday next—Mr. Black-
burne will sit at 12 o'clock precisely, and at
Six-Mile-Bridge on Saturday, for the County
Clare District.
