They next proceeded to a house on a farm belonging to Thomas Harding, Esq. Alderman of this City, where they demanded arms which the inhabitants declared were not there;—they persisted that there were, and remained some time in search, but not succeeding in finding any, they departed, uttering threats against the Association or Police should they meet them, and with the intention of attacking some of the mills in the neighbourhood, which, however, we do not learn they attempted. It is remarkable, that this was the first night the Police and Association had not visited that part of the district.

On Sunday, a party of insurgents, dressed in white shirts, entered the house of John Hurley, at Kiltcoleman, near Shanagolden, care-taker on the estate of the Earl of Clare, and not finding him within, beat his son in a cruel manner, and told him that his father should give up the care of those lands, or they would murder him.

John Healy, of Creem, near Athlone, in this County, was killed at the fair of Glenogra, in this County, on Monday. It is stated he was in the act of quarrelling with another man, when the Constables interfered, and having made violent resistance the Policeman stabbed him with his bayonet which unfortunately proved mortal.

Councillors John Doherty and J. Scott, have been appointed King's Counsel. The former gentleman has been nominated to the Recorder's Office of Waterford, vacant by the death of Mr. M'ANSELL.

A subscription commenced in Waterford this day, in behalf of the destitute Children of the late Councillor M'Donnell.

Samuel Bennett, Esq. is reinstated in the Commission of the Peace of the County Limerick.

The Hon. Major General Harris, lately appointed to the Staff in Ireland, will leave Rams-gate, on Wednesday next, for Athlone, his head quarters.

The 25th Regiment, at present in Belfast, received orders to proceed to Ennis. The first division march this day.

The 4th Dragoon Guards, from Dundalk and Belturbet, arrived at Newbridge Barracks on Saturday.

The 5th Dragoon Guards are ordered to march from Newbridge, and will have one troop quartered at each of the following places, where they will arrive, respectively on the 5th of June: Ballinrobe (head-quarters), Dunmore, Loughrea, Roscommon, Athlone, and Gort.

Four troops of the 12th Lancers (with the head-quarters) are ordered to Cork, where they will arrive on the 7th, 10th, and 14th of June. The remaining two troops proceed to Limerick, where they arrive on the 3d and 7th June.

The 6th Dragoon Guards, now quartered four troops in Cork and two in Limerick, are ordered to Dublin, and will arrive on the 10th, 14th, and 18th of June.

The 6th (Inniskillen) Dragoon Guards

who gave testimony; and another two other Policemen going to another farm adjoining to look for the remainder of the stock. The prisoners called on several respectable persons, who gave them good characters.

The Magistrates retired, and remained a considerable time in consultation. The prisoners were acquitted.

Mr. Blacker told them they ought to congratulate themselves on the merciful construction the Bench had put on their case, principally on account of their general good character, and from their part of the country being rather quiet; and hoped it would be a salutary warning, not only to themselves for the rest of their lives, but also to the whole country, for should a similar case again come before the Magistrates, neither character or other extenuation should operate in saving those engaged in it from being separated from their homes and all they held dear, and therefore desired them to be thankful that they escaped the penalty of the Act under which they had been tried, and to go home and make amends for their past conduct, by leading for the future an exemplary, quiet, and industrious life.

The Court was very crowded, and their case excited a considerable sensation, the M'Donnells being men above the lower class of society.

The Court then adjourned, to be held at Cashel on Saturday next.

At the Sessions last week, two men, named Cregahan and Ryan, were convicted, and immediately transmitted on their route to Cork.

Two of the twenty-one men convicted at Rathkeale Special Sessions under the Insurrection Act, for being found at a wake, were this morning transmitted to Cork, for transportation. The other nineteen remain in the County Jail, until further orders.

On Monday morning, forty-eight men were sent down Cork river, and put on board the convict hulk at Cove, from the Counties of Clare, Galway, and Carlow. In an hour after, twenty-four arrived from Castlebar, County Mayo; they were escorted by a party of the 22d Regiment from Malloy, commanded by Captain Butler.

On Friday last, a woodcock was shot in the demesne of Castlecor, by Edward Donne Freeman, Esq. in perfect health and high order.

Five Hundred and eighty-eight bales of Tobacco were landed at Galway from the lugger captured by the Harlequin a few days ago—one hundred and one of them are quite dry.

The 12th of June inst. is the last day for claiming debts due to the late bank of Sir William Alexander and Co. Dublin.

Some year, Mr. Cristoe, of Baubridge, sowed five acres of Flax, from which he saved half proportion of Mr. Strickland's, and sowed the seed for 44 the bushels the Flax for 10s. the stone.

Some year, Mr. David Stewart, of the County I sowed nearly two acres of Flax, and saved the seed entire, which he sold at 4s. 4s. the bushel, and at 8s. 10s. the stone. This Gentleman has sowed Flax for the last seven years, with success; he has stated in public document that he has always found the seed in him better than a corn crop, not taking into account Flax.
