

GENERAL ORDER, MAY 27.
 The Master-General has received his Majesty's
 allow'd limited number of Field Officers and
 all pay of the Royal Artillery, who may be
 sent to the 4th Regiment, to sell the regulated pri-
 ces of the Commissions of Field Officers or Captain-
 to Officers of the Line (to be selected by his
 Majesty's Commander-in-Chief) who, when pro-
 ceed to be unattached.

Some of the Officers of the Artillery thus allowed
 the privilege, will be first in the first instance
 of list, and afterwards in the usual course
 of desertion, are, by making provision
 for the retirement of Officers of the Artillery;
 Officers of the Artillery hereafter any right or
 claim to be considered.

It is presented solely with the view of remedying
 the inconvenience, and an Officer is to con-
 sider himself entitled to demand upon this arrange-
 ment to sell his Commission.

As he may be inclined to avail themselves of
 the privilege, will send their names to the
 General of the Artillery, and the Master-
 General, those who will be permitted to sell, ac-
 cording to the public convenience, and of the
 views and merits of those who shall have sent
 in their names.

 the seed at £4 4s. the bushel, and the Flax
 stone. This Gentleman has sowed Flaxseed
 in years with success; he has stated in a
 paper that he has always found the seed to pay
 a good crop, not taking into account the
 cost of the seed.

On the 12th inst. a very early rain, in Ballinvara, Great
 Britain, was accompanied by a severe frost, which was
 followed by a heavy snow, which the Rev. Father, Parsons,
 P. of the parish of St. Mary's, in the City of London, was
 obliged to feed their flocks with divine precinct of the Gos-
 pel, and we needed not the scope that accompanied his ashes
 to be grave to know, few if any were more respected in life,
 or honored in death, by his flock, than Mr. Barton. His
 parish, which were numerous, were distinguished for their
 peaceable and orderly conduct, his amicable exhortation
 being directed to impress upon his Parishioners a strict obedi-
 ence to the laws and authorities of the County. On leaving
 the place where his spirit rested, the Rev. Father, Parsons,
 thousands, and where within three miles of Newcastle-upon-
 Tyne, his horses were taken from the horse, and his remains drawn by
 his sorrowing parishioners to the Chapel, where they were
 deposited in the centre aisle, buried with the tears, and partic-
 ularly with the sobs, of thousands.
