Dublin Corn Exchange, June 18.

Prime samples of Wheat sold heavily at this day's mar-
 ket at a decline of 1s. per barrel. Oats fell 6d. and 9d. on
 last Friday's prices, and all descriptions of grain are dull.
 There is yet no revival in the Flour trade, although a reduction
 of 1s. per cwt. is now generally submitted to. Millers'
 Wheat, 30s. to 36s. and Oats, 12s. to 14s. 9d. per barrel.

London Corn Exchange, June 16.

There was a large supply of Wheat fresh in this morning,
 but scarcely a single sale could be effected. It was even at a reduction
 of from 1s. to 2s. a quarter on the finest samples, which
 inferior qualities remain unsaleable. Nothing doing in
 Barley, Oats, owing to the magnitude of the supply, or
 dullness of demand, being from 1s. to 2s. a quarter. Flour
