On Sunday night last, a party of Insurgents set fire to and totally consumed the out-offices of Mr. George Morris, of Pallas Kenry, consisting of stables, barn, and turf-house, and containing farming utensils, two hogsheads of cider, a large quantity of potatoes, turf, &c. &c.— Had it not been for Lieutenant Laurensen and his party of Police the dwelling-house and all the family would have been consumed to ashes. The following notice was found near the con- sagration:—"This is to shew all Hereticks the way that we will serve them, and to shew them that they are not to put their trust in the Peelers or Army, for when they are asleep we will be awake, and let all the bloody Orangemen of Pallas know that we are preparing for them against the 1st of July, and let them not boast of the 40 thousand, for this is the death they may all expect.—Signed by order of Captain House Burner in full Counsel at Pallas Kenry."

On same night, a party of men with their faces disguised, entered the house of a man named Keating, at Aughanish, on the banks of the Shannon, and flogged him desperately.
