On Monday last, Daniel O'Connell, convicted on Friday, of the murder of Dennis Morrissy, of Cappanahane, on the 22d of February, 1822, underwent the awful sentence of the law, by being hanged in front of the County Jail.—Before leaving his cell, he acknowledged to Sheriff Cathbert, in presence of the Clergyman who attended him, that he was concerned in breaking into Morrissy's house, but said that he did not fire the shot which deprived him of existence, and denied having any thing to do with stealing a horse from Mr. Green, of Charleville, of which he had been suspected. On O'Connell's ascending the scaffold, he was perfectly resigned, and, after a few moments conversation with the Clergy, without uttering a sentence to the vast concourse collected, he was launched into eternity. He appeared to be a well-looking fellow, between fifty and sixty years, and lived for some time as postillion in respectable families. Amongst the crowd were the mother and relatives of the unfortunate culprit, who continued uttering the most heart-rending cries. After hanging the usual time, his body was conveyed to the Infirmary for dissection. His associates in crime, being convicted for breaking into Morrissy's house, viz. Jeremiah Nunan, James O'Connell, and John Daudon, are to be executed on the 22d inst.

James Gleeson, from the neighbourhood of Newport, was hanged at Clonmel, on Saturday, for the murder of Patrick Ryan, in the year 1803.

The High Sheriff of the County of Cork has received a respite, staying the execution of Edward Murphy, under sentence of death for Saturday next, for the attack and burning Mr. Hennessy's house and mills near Castletownroche.

We are happy to be enabled to announce, that by the indefatigable exertions of Col. Sir Hugh Gough, K. C. B. the greater part of the persons who attacked the Police and Palatines at Glasneheen, on the 29th of April last, have been apprehended and were identified at Buttevant on Thursday last. Lord Doneraile, Mr. Law, Mr. Nagle, and Major Carter, met at Sir Hugh Gough's on that day, where informations were taken against the whole of the party, fifteen of whom were apprehended the night previous.

The Right Worshipful D. F. G. Mahony, Mayor, has received a communication from Thomas Jackson, Esq. authorising a liberal reward for the apprehension of the persons concerned in the murder of his steward, Michael Ryan, at Athlanchart, County Clare.—See Advt.

The dwelling-house of Mr. John Murphy, at Dunderrow, within two miles of Kinsale, was maliciously set fire to, on Sunday night last.—Several shots were fired at the windows, which alarmed Mr. Murphy, who returned the assailants fire with such promptitude, that they were forced to retreat. We are happy to say, that Mr. Murphy succeeded in extinguishing the fire before any considerable injury had been effected.

The Barossa, Captain Hutchinson, arrived in Cork harbour on Sunday, to take out adventurers to the Cape of Good Hope.

The City of Dublin Commission Grand Jury of January last, have resolved to present a Piece of Plate, value 100 guineas, to Colonel Barry, for the distinguished services of his Lordship during the late arduous inquiry into the conduct of Mr. Sheriff Thorpe.

Mr. Keane and Mr. Warde have arrived in Cork, where they are engaged to perform for some time.

A few days back a quantity of silver and gold coin, of the reigns of Mary, Elizabeth, James, Charles, and the Prince of Orange, and some Spanish coin, were found deposited in an old ditch, close to the town of Newcastle.

Mary Harvey, a convict under rule of transportation, escaped from Maryborough Jail, on Wednesday.

The Superintending Committee of the County Limerick Gaol have communicated to Baron Pennefather their intention of shortly introducing to that prison a system of strict discipline and hard labour for convicts, which his Lordship has approved of.

A quantity of Yarn is now ready for sale at the Spinning School, Newgate-lane, of the Female Association, for the City and Liberties of Limerick, where a regular supply may in future be had. As this Association is formed for the purpose of assisting the industrious poor, it is hoped a preference will be given by the purchasers of yam to that spun by them.
