WHEAT. - Notwithstanding the favourable change in the price, the speculators have not gone on as was expected; they are making great efforts, and seem determined to maintain higher prices. They have already laid the foundation for the ruin of a great many retailers, who have been compelled to do business not only without profit, but at a considerable loss; the natural consequences will follow - 52s. per quarter.

WHEAT. - Very heavy time bargains have been made in London, and such is the eagerness to buy for future shipments that prices have advanced in Ireland, whilst trade here for exportation is dull. On board, Carlow, 80s. to 81s. - Cork, 73s. to 75s. - Limerick or Cork, 72s. to 73s. - Carlow, 80s. - Waterford, 76s. - Cork or Limerick, 78s. to 82s.
