FREEMEN.

THE MAYOR thinks it due to the Freedom of Limerick
 to call their attention to the following Clause in the
 Act for the Government of the City of Limerick; and to
 inform them, that he will be ready to swear them in, at any
 time they call on him with a Docket from the Town Clerk's
 Office of the date of their admission, and with the Statute
 the Law requires—Being Three Pounds for every Freeman so
 admitted as a matter of Right.

"And whereas it is expedient to provide against the in-
 fringement of the Rights of the Freeman of the said Cor-
 poration—be it enacted, that from and after the commence-
 ment of this Act no Freeman shall be allowed to act as
 a Freeman, unless such Person shall have been duly admitted
 to his Freedom and taken his Oath as a Freeman six calen-
 dar months at the least, before he shall so act; and if any
 Person shall presume to act contrary to the true intent and
 meaning of this Act, he shall be every such offence for-
 feited and pay the sum of One Hundred Pounds to him, her or
 them, who shall inform or sue for the same in manner
 herein after mentioned; and every act done by any such
 Person before he shall have been so duly sworn and admitted
 for six calendar months shall be void and of no effect;—
 Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall extend
 or be construed to extend to any Person entitled by birth,
 marriage or heritage, to his Freedom."
