We are sorry to say, that a faithful servant lost his life in this County on Wednesday night, To those acquainted with the mild and amiable character of John Cantillon Heffernan, Esq. k will be sufficient to say, that the melancholy mistake has been keenly felt by none more than Mr. Hiffernan. Assassination being the order of the day, and the circumstance of Mr. Heffer. nan's having been previously threatened, made him doubly alert. The recital of the following has been afforded us by a person who attended the Coroner's Inquest : -

On Wednesday evening, between eight and nine o'cleck, John Cantillon Heffernan, of Manister, buying occasion to go into his garden, on his return to the house, through the shockbery, he saw a person lurking in it, and Mr. Heffernan called several times to him to stand and tell his business, on which the fellow retreated. Mr. H. got out of the garden and, joined by his servant boy, whom he left at the hall-door, went down the lawn by the side of the shrubbery, continuing to call to the man therein to surrender himself, which calls of Mr. H. and his boy on being heard by Mr. Furnell and Mr. Dwyer, who were sitting in the parlour, they ran to Mr. H's assistance; when the fellow that was in the shrubbery bearl those Gentlemen come out, he retreated to the corner of the shrobbery to get over the ditch, but the servant baving got thereon and Mr. H. having advanced into the shrubbery, the man lay concealed and Mr. H. sent Mr. Dwyer in for me gups, wise Mr. H. and Mr. F. and the servant continued calling out to the men in the shrubbery to surrender and account for himself. When Mr. D. returned with the guns he gave one to Mr. H. On the female servant's return to the kitchen, she told Wm. London, (who was groom and confdential servant of Mr. H.) that his master was attacked and the fire-arms were gone out, on which London ran out calling on the other servants to follow him to his master's assistance - be, London, having passed to the rere of Mr. H. along the dirch of the shrubbery, got out of it just at the corner the fellow lay concented in. Mr. H. conceiving London to be the lurking tellow from his having come from the corner the shrubbery, and not being aware of his being out, called to him several times not to run and to give himself up, or that he would fire on him-London continued running towards the dired to prevent the concealed fellow from getting over. never conceiving that he was the person repeatedly called to, did not reply, and just as he London was going to jump on the ditch, Mr. H. fired and shot him through the top of the shoulder. On it being ascertained who was shot Mr. H. beng inconsolable was brought in, and the servant remained with London while assistance and light was getting to bring him in, and they heard the lurking fellow escape over the duch, It is boped the fellow will be yet discovered, as it is a melancholy thing that the honest faithful London should be dot, through the darkness of the night, in endeavouring to assist his master. A Coroner's Inquest was yesterday held by Mr. James Bennett. John Crips and Villiers Peacocke, Esqu. Magistrates, also attended, with several respectable Gentlemen; and a verdict returned that the deceased came by in death by a gun-shot wound be received in a mistake for the lurking fellow that was about the house of Manister.
