THE MARKETS.

Our Corn season commenced here this day. A few loads of white Wheat appeared, which were readily bought up by the Millers at 17d. 18d. and 19d. per stone, the quality in general considered good. A few parcels of new Oats fetched 10d. a stone, and Barley 11d. Butter in small supply, owing
