DUBLIN OCTOBER 23.

It may be recollected by the public, that, a few days ago, two of the females in the service of the late murdered family of Franks, were brought up from the South, in order to their being examined by certain authorities in Dublin, on the horrible crime of which they had been guilty. The females were accompanied by Mr. Smith, a respectable and intelligent officer, who, after a daily attendance of seventeen days at Dublin, and no examination having taken place, left on Saturday.

On Sunday last, during the performance of Divine Worship, a shower of stones was thrown through the windows of St. Thomas's Church, which occasioned several panes of glass, and occasioned a considerable alarm to a part of the congregation. Instances of aggression of this nature are increasing.

On Monday evening, between the hours of five and six, as Mr. William Smith, Methodist Minister, was proceeding along Arran-quay, he was met by four ruffians, who divided themselves if to allow him to pass; but just as he was making through the space they had left, they closed on him, and began to jostle him, during which time one of them dispossessed him of his watch. Mr. Smith being elderly and feeble, was not able to pursue them, and so at present they have escaped.

On Tuesday morning, the house of Thomas Ellis, in P. was robbed of plate to a very considerable amount. The plate was recovered, in the neighbourhood of Dorset-street, through the active services of Messrs. Symes and Farrell, but the thieves have, for the present, escaped.

It is generally rumoured yesterday, that a duel had taken place at Ballinasloe, between a Mr. S. and a Mr. S. in which the former person is supposed to have been mortally wounded.

Mr. S. has, during his last visit to this Kingdom, drawn houses in Cork, Waterford, Newry, Londonderry, and Belfast, to the amount of £4,000 and upwards!

On Friday last, at a numerous and very respectable Meeting of various denominations, Protestants, Roman Catholics, Presbyterians and Unitarians, held in the Court-house of Castlebar; a Society, auxiliary to the Hibernian Bible Society, was formed for the Southern District of the County.

Wednesday afternoon, Walter M'Carthy, an oysterman, died in the County Hospital. It appeared in evidence before the Mayor, as Coroner, and a Jury, who sat on that day, and also yesterday, by adjournment, that the unfortunate deceased, whilst in a public-house in the Irishtown, and in a state of inebriation, fell off the table, and descending on an earthen floor, received an interior fracture in the head, of which he languished in a state of stupor, until death relieved his agony. The Jury returned a verdict accordingly. Michael Slattery, charged on oath with throwing the deceased M'Carthy off the table, is lodged in Jail.

Thursday, the Mayor held an Inquest on a male child, found dead near the new Lunatic Asylum. Verdict—"Wilful Murder against persons unknown."

On Wednesday, Patrick M'Namara fell into a dye vat at a hatter's, in Mary-street, and was severely burnt from his breast to his feet; he lies dangerously ill in the County Infirmary.

On Tuesday night, Michael Serket, a slater, on his way home, was met by a party of fellows in the Old Town, who, mistaking him for one of their opponents with whom they had disagreed at a dance, inflicted several dreadful wounds on his head which it is thought will prove mortal.

This morning, about an hour before day, a shot was fired through the bed-room window of Edward Barry, at Kildimo, in this County, in the direction of his bed. The shot luckily did not take effect. Three bullets were found in the room at day-light.

A few nights ago, the houses of Mr. Thomas Bindon and John Bindon, both of Ballycasy, near Kildimo, in this County, were attacked and entered by a number of well armed ruffians, and both the Bindons severely beat. The former was ordered to part his wife, and with which he was obliged to comply.

Tuesday night last, several large stacks of straw, one car, some empty bags, and farming utensils, were consumed on the lands of Newcastle, near this City. Whether this burning was accidental or malicious, remains to be ascertained, but the owners are seeking for compensation, under the latter.

On the night of Wednesday last, the house of Mr. William M. Saunders, near Scartaglin, County Kerry, was attacked by a banditti of whiteboys, who, having by threats and menaces of fire and destruction to the house and family, obtained admittance, immediately presented a gun and bayonet at Mr. Saunders, and demanded his arms; he answered he had none.
