He was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the 21st Light Dragoons on 20th November, 1782, and reduced with the regiment 24th June, 1787. He received the Lieutenant-Colonelcy of the 7th Light Dragoons, 18th November, 1790; the Brevet of Colonel, 12th October, 1793; the rank of Major-General, 20th February, 1795; and the Colonelcy of the 14th Light Dragoons, 1st June, 1797. His Lordship served as Major-General on the Staff in Ireland till May, 1796, when he was removed to the Staff of the Eastern District in England, where he continued till 25th December, 1802. He received the rank of Lieutenant-General, 29th April, 1812, and that of General, 1st January, 1812. His Lordship purchased, with the exception of the Majority of the 20th Light Dragoons, his different regimental Commissions.

We are happy in hearing that strenuous efforts are making for the formation of a Legal and Literary Society, composed exclusively of the Students of the King's Inns.

On Wednesday a most extraordinary action came on before the Recorder, who sat to try Civil Bills. Dr. Dixon brought an action for the recovery of £14 he had paid to Dr. Hahnemann, as fees on his attendance, for the purpose of curing him of epilepsy. The cure had not been perfected. Plaintiff's Counsel, Mr. Bennett, urged that his client was entitled to the sum paid in failure of the performance of the contract.—Mr. Dunn and Mr. Bethel contended on the other side. Mr. Hahnemann's advertisements, were read, Plaintiff's Counsel seeking to prove that the defendant was but a pretender to the Esculapean art. In this particular case, Mr. Bennett stated, that Dr. H. had advised Dr. D. never to ride on the outside of a coach, where a falling sickness would be rendered doubly dangerous, but had not cured his patient. The Recorder thought this singular case one of first impressions; there was no precedent, therefore, for his interposition; and the Court could not order restitution under such circumstances, or compel the defendant to refund his fees.

On Sunday night last, a stack of wheat was maliciously burned on the lands of Shantrade, between Kildimo and Adare. This corn was a few days before, distrained and sold for rent.

Three Sheep, the property of a poor industrious man, named Lyons, were maliciously killed last week, on the lands of Gurtardun, bounding Clounlahard, and within about two miles of Shanagolden; their carcases were found next day on the lands, mangled in the most brutal manner.

A few nights ago, some Corn which had previously been sold for rent, was carried away from the lands of Ballyphilip, near Cork, in this County.

Last night, James McKilry, a mariner belonging to the Margaret, of Rothsay, at the Long Dock, fell overboard and was drowned—when the tide ebbed he was discovered lying under the keel of a vessel near his own.

Last night, William Phillips, a lad belonging to the Margaret, of London, at the Custom-House Quay, fell overboard and was also drowned—his body has not yet been found.

Yesterday evening Honor Morrissy, died at Pennywell, from the effects of a beating given by her husband, John Morrissy, who has fled.—The Mayor has summoned a Jury to hold an inquest.

The verdict of the inquest on the body of Rose Smith, shot at Kilmurry, County Clare, in a row during the valuation of tithes, was,—“that she came by her death by a gun-shot wound fired by the Police in their own defence.” The Police did not accompany the valuers, but were patrolling in the neighbourhood to preserve the peace, if necessary.

This morning, at five o'clock, 12 convicts left the County jail, on their way to Cork, they having arrived here yesterday ay, four from Ennis, and the remainder from Cas Elebar and Leitrim.

Thomas and Peter McKenna are lodged in Tralee Gaol, by R. E. Esq., for depriving a centinel of the 29th Regiment of his arms.
