Their Graces the Archbishops, and their Lordships the Bishops of Ireland, are all expected in town this day, to attend the half-yearly meeting of the Board of First Fruits to morrow.

The Parochial Deputies having waited until the eve of Term, in expectation of receiving the promised answer to their memorial, presented some months since to the Lord Lieutenant, praying his Excellency might instruct the Attorney-General to file an information against the Treasurer of the Corporation, on foot of the misappropriation of the Metal Main Tax, as recommended by a Select Committee of the House of Commons, and not having been honoured with the promised reply, three of the Deputies namely, Mr. Stewart, Mr. Purdy, and Mr. M'Mullen, in co-operation with Mr. Henry Staines, of Abbey-street, and in full assurance of support, have, under the advice of Counsel, applied to the Attorney-General, who has, at their instance, as Relaters, filed an Information against the Corporation; and the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, and Treasurer were yesterday served with Process accordingly.

The Freemasons of England are exempted from the operation of the existing laws relative to Secret Societies—not so in Ireland.—We understand that the heads of the Masonic order in Ireland, having recently urged to Government their claim for the exemption being extended to Ireland, on the grounds that the order of Free Masonry positively excluded any political or religious discussion from their lodges, the reply given, was, that unless they tendered for registry a copy of the Freemason's obligation—if such existed, nothing could be done by Government, that would enable them to resume their sitting in Lodges, &c. We can learn that the British Ministry are rather inclined to discourage the continuance of the Lodge-Meetings in England, although they do not intend to introduce any alteration of the existing law for the purpose.

The Police, enrolled for the County Mayo, have been ordered to Ballinasloe for drill, equipment, &c. to arrive there on the 5th November and to report themselves to the Inspector-General on the 6th.

The other vessel, supposed to be the Brothers, (a renowned smuggler on the English coast) was about to be boarded by the Waterguard, but taking advantage of a sudden breeze, got under sail and escaped.
