The Freemasons of England are exempted from the operation of the existing laws relative to Secret Societies-not so in Ireland .- We understand that the heads of the Masonic order in Ireland, having recently urged to Government their claim for the exemption being extended to Ireland, on the grounds that the order of Free Masoury positively excluded any political or religious discussion from their lodges, the reply given, was, that unless they tendered for registry a copy of the Freemason's obligation-if such existed, nothing could be done by Government, that would enable them to resume their sitting in Lodges, &c. We can learn that the British Ministry are rather inclined to discourage the continuance of the Lodge-Meetings in England, although they do not intend to introduce any alteraion of the existing law for the purpose.
