sober in her wishes, she was herself a practical testimony,
that moderation is the enjoyment of her religion was
wisdom to her character; earnest, rational and deep, it
was nobly cultivated in her closet, and unostentatiously
manifested only in its fruits. During a protracted and
hopeless malady, it sustained her, not merely with resig-
nation, but with cheerful confidence, and she, her latter end
dear, she was more and more detached from that world,
above the vanities of which she had habitually lived. The
writer of these lines had the happiness to witness the calm,
placid, unexpressed confidence which, in her last hours,
deprived death of its sting; and the wish which they fer-
vently breathed, he now dispositionally holds: that he may
be enabled, like her, to live, and like her, to die.
