On Wednesday evening last, between six and  
seven o'clock, two men, named Robert Vallenca  
and Laurence Lyons, who were placed as keepers  
on some corn, distrained for rent, on the lands  
of Tully, three miles beyond the town of Kilfinan,  
in this County, were barbarously murdered—  
one on the lands, and the other on his return  
from the fair of Mitchelstown, within the bounds  
of the County Cork. The following day, Cor-  
ners' Inquests were held at Mitchelstown and  
Kilfinan, and verdicts of wilful murder against  
some persons unknown returned. Two brothers  
named Welsh, of Tully, over whom the deceased  
men had been keepers, have been apprehended,  
and are now in custody; and, from the exertions  
made by the Magistrates and Police of that  
neighbourhood, assisted by Charles Bennett,  
Esq. Coroner, there is every hope that the  
murderers will be brought to justice.

Yesterday, a farmer from Athlone, came into  
Limerick to sell some corn, and not wishing to  
employ a broker, took his corn to the Stores and  
sold it himself, when, after receiving his money,  
and on his way home, about a mile from Limer-  
rick on the Roxborough road, he was waylaid  
by four men, and severely beaten; and had it  
not been for John Burns, of the City Police,  
who was accidentally passing at the time, there  
is little doubt he would have been robbed of the  
money he received for his corn, if not murdered;  
the Policeman made every exertion to secure the  
offenders, but they divided themselves, and  
threw stones which made it impossible.
