Letters Patent have passed the Great Seal of Ireland, granting to the Rev. Somers Payne, the Rectory of Ardagh, in the Diocese of Cloyne.

The very Rev. the Dean of Limerick has been pleased to appoint the Rev. John Croker, of Craon Glebe, A. B. a Vicar's Choral, or Minor Canon to St. Mary's Cathedral, Limerick, vacant by the death of the Rev. Richard Croker.

The Rev. Joshua Berkeley has been promoted to the Vicarage of the Holy Trinity in Cork, become vacant by the demise of the Rev. Robert Meara.

A Vestry was held in the Cathedral of Kildare, on Monday last, to take into consideration the Tithe Act, when the further proceedings were postponed to that day three weeks. The Lord Bishop was at the meeting.

At an adjourned Vestry, held the 27th ult. in the Parish Church of Lea, in the Queen's County, for the purpose of carrying the Tithe Act into effect, eighteen Special Vestrymen being present, a proposal was made by the Dean of Kildare for compounding for the Rectorial Tithes, and by the Rev. Rawdon Greene, for the Vicarial Tithes of that Parish, by an amicable agreement; and the sums demanded by those Gentlemen having been unanimously agreed to by the Vestry, and the Bishop's consent having been obtained thereto, the same was immediately adopted. The certificate was duly signed by Robert Moore, Esq. Commissioner on the part of the Church, and by George Adair, Esq. on the part of the Parish. It is supposed the acreable assessment upon the Parish will be about 13¹/₂d or 14d. per acre.

The fair of Ardagh, which was held on Friday last, was remarkably well attended by buyers from various quarters. Pigs were on the advance, and numbers bought up. Horned cattle rather low, and a damp in consequence of the fall on hides and tallow. Sheep in very poor demand, and but few lots.

The Hon. FRANCIS A. PRITTY, Esq. Recorder of Clonmel, presided. Resolved—That the opinion of the Association on the subject of Beaumage on Corn, whether it should be levied or not; and that a case be prepared and presented to the Legislature, and that the result be made public.

Local Associations having been formed in the following places, viz. Cashel, Caher, Thurles, Tipperary, Templemore, Roscrea, Kilkenny, &c. Resolved—That we invite communications from such Societies, furnishing us with such information as may appear to them useful in forwarding the views of this Association.

Resolved—That this Association do recommend to the different Local Associations in this County, the extensive cultivation of Flax, and do hereby engage to give such encouragement and assistance as may be necessary for the manufacturing thereof and of Wool as well as of either in Money, or Implements of Manufactory.

Resolved—That we do recommend the sale of Course Linens, from 4hd. to 8d. per yard, and do hereby engage to purchase them, by which there will be a considerable saving in the bleaching of the same, if a considerable saving in the bleaching capital is necessary.

Resolved—That the cordial thanks be presented to the Rt. Hon. the Countess of Cork, for her zealous, indefatigable and persevering support of this Society and for the useful information which she has so frequently been kind enough to communicate to the Ladies who have honored our meetings with their presence.
