There was a fair supply of Wheat at Market this day, and  
brisk demand for good qualities, which went off from 15d.  
to 19d per stone for 22s, and 16d. to 20d. per do. for  
Wheat; inferior sorts were dull of sale.—Oats, from 8d. to  
9d. per stone.—Barley, 10d. per stone.—There was  
a decline in the price of Pork last week, but it is now  
steady at 28s. per cwt.—Potatoes, 2l. to 2d. per stone;  
Mutton, 3d. to 4s. per lb.; Beef, 3d. to 4d.—Butter, in  
good demand, and steady at 88s. 6d. 7s. 7d. and 8s. per  
cwt., and an advance on these prices has been given by some  
purchasers.—Byssed, 22s. per cwt.—Chin, from 6d. to  
25s. per barrel—Market Tallow, 5s. 0d. per stone; and  
slaughtered do. 5s. 6d. per stone.
