This morning, at ten o'clock, the Lord Chancellor attended in his private room when Mr. Wetherell, Esq. M. P. was sworn in to the office of Solicitor-General.

The other law officers recently appointed were sworn in on Friday last, in Lincoln's Inn-hall, namely, Sir Robert Gifford, as Lord Chief Justice of the Common Pleas; William Alexander, Esq. as Chief Baron of the Exchequer; and Sir John Singleton Copley, as Attorney-General.

William Henry Reynolds, was tried and convicted at the Old Bailey, this day, and sentenced to be hanged, for shooting at General Burton.

The Privy Council have determined, after a great deal of discussion, in which Mr. Justice Park took the lead, not to carry the sentence of death on Hunt into execution. It is supposed that he will be transported for life.

Mr. Pearce, a respectable Solicitor, of Bristol, has been missing since Saturday se'night, and it is supposed he is drowned.

John Lay, a native of Tipperary, was apprehended near Black Church, charged with the murder of John Fitzgerald, at Rathangan, who was found with his throat cut in his bed. The description of Lay was given by one of Major Tandy's Police, to some workmen employed on the road, who apprehended him. They were assisted in escorting him to Naas by a gentleman travelling in his carriage. It was very creditable, that the apprehension of this man should have been chiefly effected by workmen repairing the Naas road, and proves most distinctly that among the lower classes in that district, a proper sense of obedience to the laws exists. The offender, we are told, insinuated himself in the house of his victim, by representing himself as the husband of his daughter, who had some time since made a private match with a soldier and went to England. Having taken all the cash he could from the poor old man, it is alledged that Lay, who lodged in his house, cut his throat in a horrible manner, while a sleep in his bed.

Wednesday and Thursday, Mr. Blackburne presided at Rathkeale, under the Insurrection Act, when the following Magistrates attended: John S. Brown, George Massy, Thos. H. Royse, Wm. R. Yielding, Major Sullivan, John Creagh, Robert Peppard, Knight of Glin, Rev. George Vincent, James F. Massy, George M. Mansell, Alfred Furlong, Rev. Edw. Geraghty, Thomas Furlong, and Thos. P. Vokes, C. M. P.

There were thirty-four prisoners for trial, one of whom only was convicted, Edmund Whelan, for being absent from his place of abode, at Ballyallinan, in this County, on the night of the 17th May last. The others were acquitted.

Yesterday, Mr. Blackburne presided at a Special Sessions, in the City Court-House, assisted by the Recorder of Limerick, Aldermen A. Watson, Sir C. Marrett, D. F. G. Mahony, and Captain Drought; when Michael Leo was tried as idle and disorderly, being absent from his abode at Ballinacurra, in the South Liberties, on the 4th of January; after a short investigation the prisoner was acquitted. The Sessions were then adjourned to Saturday, the 21st of February next.

The City Quarter Sessions ended yesterday, and the following were convicted since our last:--Edmond and John Nash and Thomas and Patrick M'Namara, for a riot and assault, one week's imprisonment and hard labour.

On Wednesday evening, the Mayor held an inquisition on the body of Edmund Cussen, who died in the County Jail that morning---Verdict "died by fever."
