On Monday last, fifteen men were apprehended at Toomavara, County Tipperary, by that active Magistrate, Thomas R. Pepper, Esq. and a party of Police. It appears they had collected from different parts of the country, and were sitting in committee at the time of their apprehension. Several papers of a seditious nature were found in their possession by the Police, and they were immediately forwarded to the gaol of Nenagh, where they will be tried this day, under the Insurrection Act, before Mr. Blacker.

At the Special Sessions under the Insurrection Act, held at Fermoy on Saturday, before Mr. Blacker, Edward Magner was found guilty for being absent from his dwelling, and sentenced to seven years transportation.

Mr. Blackburne left town on Saturday in the mail for Dublin, after adjourning the Insurrection Court to Saturday next, the 24th inst.

On Sunday last, a pensioner, named Michael Namara, was found drowned in the dyke on the right of the Canal bank; he has been missing since Twelfth night. A Coroner's Inquest was held on the body by Alderman Watson and Sir C. Marrett--Verdict, "Accidental death by drowning."

At a General Meeting of the Clergy of the United Diocesses of Kilmacduagh and Kilsenora, held in the New Parish Chapel of St. Joseph, Tuamvara, on the 13th instant, the Very Rev. Doctor Edmond French, Warden of Galway, was unanimously elected to the vacant See; and the postulation proceeded to Rome for the approbation and confirmation of the Holy See.

The Clergy and Inhabitants of Drogheda have presented an Address to Doctor Curtis, in his late recovery from indisposition.

The 73d Regiment have arrived at Castlebar. The 57th are to do duty in Cork until next March, when they will embark there for the Isle of France.

The 1st division of the 77th Regt. marched from Fermoy on Monday morning, for Ballinacarra, where they were met by the City of Cork steam-rocket, and proceeded in her for the safe transport at Cove; the second division, with the baggage took the same route this morning and will be put on board the Dorothy Forster and Palembang transports. It is expected that these vessels will be ready for sea, towards the close of the week, and sail for their destination.

The 93d Regiment, which sailed from Cork on the 20th November, for the West Indies, is ordered to Barbadoes.

A detachment of the 2d battalion of the 1st Royal Regiment, quartered in Clonmel, has received orders to proceed to Chatham, previous to embarking for India, to join the 1st battalion of that gallant corps.

A gentleman who had been present at the embarkation of the recruits at Waterford a few days since, states that the average of 380 lads did not exceed 20 years each.

The good effects of this application will be more fully explained in reference to the annexed Statement, to which (as an explanation), that about £12 appropriated to the principal branch of spinning Linen Yarn, has afforded employment to several Individuals at their own dwellings during the year.

A facility has also been maintained (as far as the circumstances would admit) for the Poor to supply themselves with clothing. For this purpose an assortment of useful Garments, is constantly kept up at the Society, to be disposed of at prime or half cost, as the necessities of the Poor seemed to require.

The subscriptions received during the early part of the year being limited, prevented the Committee from extending their operations; but they are now looking forward with a degree of confidence to the usefulness of the Institution, from the increase that has of late been evinced, by some of our fellow-citizens becoming subscribers. We acknowledge the receipt of £20 British, from the Central Committee in America, being a gift from the British and Irish Ladies Association in London, in token of their approval of the system upon which it is conducted, your Committee having some time since submitted to them a few of its reports.

We hope the liberal spirit manifested by the former will extend its influence, and stimulate those who are afflicted with the distresses of their fellow-creatures, to contribute in support of an Institution so well calculated to improve their condition.
