DEATHS.

On Tuesday night, at Coolen, (the seat of his son-in-law,
Joseph Mason, Esq.) Sir Richard Harte, Knight. He was
the oldest Magistrate in the County of Limerick, and one of
the Aldermen of this City. He served the office of Sheriff
of the City of Limerick in 1768; was twice Mayor, viz. in
1774, and in 1808, in which year he received the honor of
Knighthood in Dublin, from the late Duke of Richmond,
then Lord Lieutenant, on the 6th June. In the year 1776,
an Independent Corps of Infantry was ordered to be raised in
Ireland, under Major Dalrymple, of the 67th Regiment, and
from the influence of Sir Richard Harte, a considerable por-
tion of them were enrolled in this City, in which he com-
manded a Company for some time. He discharged all
the duties incumbent upon him with an assiduous fidelity,
highly honourable to himself, and beneficial to his Country.
In the private departments of life, he was eminently distin-
guished by all those amiable virtues, which are the best
sources of social and domestic felicity. His life of activity
and temperance was blessed with health, scarcely inter-
rupted until a short period before his death. Having nearly
completed his 88th year, he departed this transitory stage,
full of years and full of honor, respected when living, and
justly regretted when dead.
