John Rodgers, a publican, at Tulla, is lodged
in Eavis Jail, for attacking and robbing with
four others, three men of Mr. Sampson's, of
Dunmore, near Maryfort, one of whom named
Molony, has been dangerously wounded.

A fire broke out in the stores of James Black,
Esq. Brunswick-street, about ten o'clock on
Wednesday night. The Sun and Atlas Fire-
Engines were on the spot; the flames were
extinguished in a short time, before any damage
was done; it was caused by one of the flues
taking fire, which was increased by a piece of
timber therein. The Police were particu-
larly active on the occasion.

Thursday morning, the body of Eliza Arm-
strong, an interesting looking girl, between 17
and 18 years, daughter of a shoemaker, in Pen-
nywell, was found in the Canal. The Mayor
immediately after held an Inquest on the body,
when it appeared that she received some admo-
nitions for being in company with a married man
in the neighbourhood, whose wife was not one
of those unsuspecting beings that look with indif-
ference on the alluring and out-rivalling charms
of youth. The deceased being unable to bear
the rebuke, or the more pointed observations of

the Canal, on Tuesday night. The Mayor having
examined several witnesses on Thursday, resu-
med the inquiry yesterday, and at a late hour in
the evening the Jury returned the following
verdict:--"Found drowned on Thursday, in
the Canal, into which she had thrown herself, on
Tuesday last."

who died there on that morning. Verdict--
"Died by the visitation of God." Madigan
was a native of Glin, and confined in jail for
illicit distillation.
