THE Commissioners of Stamps, in pursuance of the Powers vested in them by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Fourth Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, entitled "An Act to grant additional Stamp Duties on certain Proceedings in the Court of Chancery, and in the Equity Side of the Court of Exchequer in Ireland," hereby give Notice, that the several Devices, Types, Stamps and Marks, heretofore used for denoting on Vellum, Parchment and Paper, the Duties granted under and by virtue of the said Act, on certain Proceedings in the Court of Chancery, containing the Words "Chancery Fund," as also the Devices, Types, Stamps, and Marks used for denoting the Duties payable under the said Act, on certain Proceedings in the Equity Side of the Court of Exchequer, containing the Words—"Exchequer Fund," and all of which several Devices, Types, Marks or Stamps, denoted the Amount of the Duty of each in Words, and were impressed or marked on Parchment or Paper with Printers' Ink, will, from and after the 24th day of January instant, be discontinued, and other Devices, Types, Stamps or Marks, will, from thenceforth, be used for denoting the said Duties; which new Devices, Types, Marks or Stamps, for denoting the Duties payable on Proceedings in the Court of Chancery, contain the Words "Chancery Fund"; and those for denoting the Duties payable on Proceedings in the Court of Exchequer, contain the Words "Exchequer Fund"; and all of same contain the Amount of Duty denoted by each of such Devices or Stamps, respectively expressed in Words, which Words, and the Words "Chancery Fund," or "Exchequer Fund," are embossed or raised, and accompanied by Devices produced in Printers' Ink.

And if any of the Proceedings, Matters, or Things, upon which such Duties are imposed by the said Act, shall after the 1st day of March next, be written on Vellum, Parchment, or Paper, impressed with the Devices, Types, Stamps, or Marks so discontinued, the same shall be of no other Effect than if written on Paper not stamped, and the Parties writing or using same shall be subject to the Penalties imposed on Persons writing same upon Paper not stamped.

And the Commissioners further give Notice, that any Persons having in their Possession any Vellum, Parchment or Paper impressed with the Stamps so discontinued, will, on bringing the same to the Stamp-Office in William-street, within Four Months from the First Day of March next, receive from the Commissioners, in lieu of the said Stamps so discontinued, any Number of such New Stamps of equal
