Letters by the Lisbon packet state, that several General Officers had been assassinated.

The Lusitania, arrived in the Downs from Bremen's Land, sailed from Rio Janeiro with Jan. and brings accounts, that at that every thing remained tranquil, but all were dissatisfied with the arbitrary measures of the Emperor, and the British Officers complained of the bad faith of the Government in abiding by its engagements. The Pedro of 74 guns, (Lord Cochrane's flag Captain Crosby, was fitting out; and the Troy, 28 guns, formerly Blaze, commanded by Mr. Taylor, once a Lieutenant in the navy; the Caroline, 48 guns, commanded by an English ship-master, named Thompson, and the Peranga, a fine 60 gun frigate, in Norton, were ready for sea, but could procure men in the service, owing to neither prize-money being paid. Lord had declared his intention of not proceeding to sea until the prizes were condemned, and men paid. Many English subjects were killed during the ship's stay at Rio, about three nights before she sailed, Mr. a very fine young man, Master's mate of Majesty's ship Driver, was murdered whilst going into a canoe.

Great alarm was excited in London, on Saturday, by private accounts, which stated, that very valuable captures of British Merchants, to the amount, as reported, of many sail, had been made by the Algerines.

## DUBLIN, MARCH 18.

There was a splendid Ball and Supper given at the Castle last night by his Excellency the Lieutenant, in honour of our Patron Saint's

There is every expectation that the Lord Lieutenant will shortly visit Munster, and remain in the country a few days.

There is some talk in London of the probable resignation of Mr. Goulburn, and the accession of Mr. Frankland Lewis to the Irish Secretaryship. A second Ex-Officio information has been issued by the Attorney-General, against the Proprietors of the Star newspaper.

Ahacross, near Kildorrery, was inhumanly murdered on Thursday night, by a party of armed ruffians. They broke into his house, and killed him with a bayonet, having also broke his wife's arm.

On Tuesday night a horrible murder was committed at Galmoy, situate within twelve miles of the City of Kilkenny, on the person of an opulent Farmer named Marum, and Brother of the Roman Catholic Bishop of that Diocese.

Yesterday, John Cox, Esq. Coroner, held an Inquest on the body of Patrick Bourke, of Boline, near Kildimo, in this County, who came by his death from the stroke of a hurly or some other weapon on his head, after a hurling match on Patrick's Day, by some person unknown.—Verdict, wilful murder. The Rev. Mr. Franklin and Mr. Laurenson, C. C. Police, attended and the Jury was most respectable.

On Wednesday, Eliza Lee, residing in Mary-street, was found dead in her bed, to which she had retired at an early hour that morning, in a state of intoxication. The Mayor held an Inquest on the body, when it appeared that the unfortunate woman (whose profession was that of seducing females from the path of virtue,) continued in a state of inebriation the entire of Tuesday, and that her death was caused by the bursting of a blood-vessel—her wicked associates were so horrified with the sudden demise of their matron, that they all have abandoned the state of wretchedness they were in, and have been received into the House of Industry.

Francis McDonough, of Galway, fell out of a sloop at Tarbert, on Sunday, in a state of intoxication, and was drowned.

A Sailor belonging to the Peregrine, of Milford, lying at our Quays, fell overboard on Thursday night last, and was unfortunately drowned.

Thursday as a servant girl was in the act of airing a bed, on one of the bow windows, at the rear of George's-quay, the bow gave way, and she and the bed were precipitated from the third story into a yard, by which her legs and one of her hands were dreadfully fractured, her teeth scattered about the yard, and otherwise so injured as to render her recovery very doubtful.

The Mayor having received information, that a party of fellows who are in the habit of plundering farm-houses of poultry, had taken up their abode in this city, detached a party of the Police, on Wednesday night, who after a harassing search, succeeded in securing seven of the gang, one of whom has informed against his associates, of various robberies, and particularly that of stealing thirty geese from Cratloe, County Clare, a few nights ago; and also at Cahernarry in the Liberties.

An Inquest was held on Wednesday afternoon, by the Mayor, on the body of John Manning, confined for debt in the County Jail. Verdict—died of fever.

The Police stopped two men, at Cratloe pike, with a pig which they had stolen from Six-mile-bridge, this morning.
