The proceedings of Wednesday and Thursday
in both Courts, appear in our fourth page.—
The trial of Sullivan for attempting to murder
Mr. Neagle, near Kilmallock, will be read with
interest; the apprehension of the culprits is
mainly attributable to the exertions of Eyre
Evans, Esq. whose activity as a Magistrate is
highly praiseworthy, as he has brought several
criminals for most heinous offences to Justice.

FRIDAY, MARCH 19.

The Hon. Justice Torrens entered the County Record
Court at 11 o'clock, and proceeded on criminal business

Edward Hornu and William Carroll, for stealing a pig on
the 8th February, from Andrew Brown, at Ballydaban.—
Guilty; to be transported 7 years.

John Keating and Denis Molony, for stealing two pigs
from Martin Connell. Keating not guilty; Molony, who
offered the pig for sale to Keating, guilty.

Robert Crimmin, a farmer, for stealing a quantity of
oats from Edward Burke, at Crough. It appeared in
evidence that the prisoner seized the oats for money due to
him, and not with the felonious intention charged.—Not
guilty.

Michael Connolly was indicted for the murder of Michael
Egan, at Eiton, on the 31 March last, by a blow of a spade
tree. It was proved in evidence that the parties were coming
from the fair of Knockturn, and that the prisoner in a riot
or crowd struck the deceased a blow, when he was seen to
fall. The nature of the case could not be at all clearly
ascertained from the witnesses, who were at some distance
from the scene, and the Jury found the prisoner guilty of
manslaughter. The Court sentenced him to transportation
for 7 years.

Patrick Daniel M'Coy, Thomas Mulvihill, and John
Mulanby, for administering an unlawful oath to Patrick
Kelly, on the 27th October last, to give up his farm at
Dromada; the former for administering it, and the others for
assisting. The Jury returned a verdict of acquittal; but
the Judge required the prisoner, M'Coy, to find bail to keep
the peace to all his Majesty's subjects for 7 years, himself in
£50, and two sureties in £25 each.

Michael Guerin, for stealing a guinea and a dollar from
Catherine Conway, at Cromwell's Hill—Not guilty, the
Prosecutrix not appearing.

John Murphy, stealing three geese from John Morrissey, at
Lisnfullen, on the 22d December—Guilty; to be confined
one month.

Philip and David Baker, father and son, of Adare, for
stealing a pig and butter, the property of various persons in
that village, in January last. There were four indictments,
the three first were not attempted to be sustained, and the
last went to the Jury on the testimony of Charles Coomy,
who swore he was a partner in the robbery; his evidence was
contradictory in several instances, and he varied on a most
material point as to where the property was concealed, with
a Witness, one of the Police, who apprehended him. The
Prisoners received good characters, and were acquitted.

The Jury did not leave the box in any of the above trials.

The number of Burning Petitions presented this Assizes, in
comparison with the last, were very few.

The learned Judge, in the course of the day, remarked
upon the enormous charges made by Crown Witnesses, as
compensation for their expenses in attending the Court; his
Lordship added, that it was made a complete trade of, and
he would not sanction such an extravagant expenditure of the
public money: the practice was really carried to a shame-
ful extent.
