The proceedings of Wednesday and Thursday in both Courts, appear in our fourth page.-The trial of Sullivan for attempting to murder Mr. Neagle, near Kilmallock, will be read with interest; the apprehension of the culprits is mainly attributable to the exertions of Eyre Evans, Esq. whose activity as a Magistrate is highly praiseworthy, as he has brought several criminals for most helnous offences to Justice.

FRIDAY, MARCH 19.

The Hon. Justice Torress entered the County Record Court at 11 o'clock, and proceeded on criminal hastness

Edward Horau and William Carroll, for stealing a pig on the 8th February, from Andrew Brown, at Ballydahan .-Guilty; to be transported 7 years.

John Kenting and Denis Molony, for stealing two pigs from Martin Connell. Keating not guilty; Molony, who offered the pig for sale to Kenting, guilty.

Robert Crimmin, a farmer, for stealing a quantity of oats from Edward Burke, at Crongh. It appeared in evidence that the prisoner selsed the outs for money due to him, and not with the felonious intention charged .- Not guilty.

Michael Connolly was indicted for the murder of Michael Egan, Elton, on the 3d March last, by a blow of a spade tree. Was proved to evidence that the parties were coming from the fair of Knocktoran, and that the prisoner in a riot or crowd struck the decensed a blow, when he was seen to fall. The nature of the case could not be at all clearly ascertained from the witnesses, who were at some distance from the scene, and the Jury found the prisoner guilty of manslaughter. The Court sentenced him to transportation for Tyears.

Patrick Daniel M'Coy, Thomas Mulvibil, and John Mulcuby, for administering an unlawfol oath to Patrick Kelly, on the 27th October last, to give up his farm at Dromada; the former for administering it, and the others for assisting. The Jury returned a verdict of acquittal; but the Judge required the prisoner. M'Coy, to find buil to keep the truce to all his Majesty's subjects for 7 years, bimself in £50, and two sureties in £25 each.
