The Lord Lieutenant will hold a Drawing-room at the Castle, on the 29th instant.

Lord and Lady Waterpark have left Caher for London.

The interest on the Grand Canal Loan is now payable at Latouche's Bank.

Mrs. Kyle gave a crowded and splendid rout, at the Provost's House, on Monday night.

On Friday last, owing to the horse taking fright and running off at full speed, Mrs. Dood, of Stapolin near Dublin, a venerable and highly respectable lady, was thrown from her car and instantly expired.

On Sunday night last, within two or three miles of the town of Trim, in the county of Meath, no less than nine houses were maliciously destroyed upon one townland.

A man named Haley was murdered near the Church of Magheraclury, County Monaghan, where several outrages have been committed.

A Gentleman and Lady were attempted to be robbed in Sackville-street, on Sunday night.

At Kildare Assizes, an Englishman was convicted for the murder of Fitzgerald, his father-in-law, and executed on Saturday. The men charged with the murder of Thomas Hill, at the fair of Kiltel, were acquitted.

The men charged with a riot at Maghera, when a man was killed, after the mob threw stones at Easign Elliott, 77th Regiment, were tried on Monday, at Derry, and acquitted.

All the persons to be tried at Londonderry Assizes, for the fatal riots at Maghera, in June, where several were killed, were discharged from the Dock in consequence of a mutual concession on both sides, and a determination to abstain in future from a display of party feeling. Mr. Snel was specially retained by the Roman Catholic party. In the evening, the individuals of the two parties joined together in little harmonious circles, and, over the social glass, forgave and forgot their former animosities.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has respite Donnelly, who, at last Antrim Assizes was sentenced to be hanged, for conniving with Ashenurst, in pilfering bank notes from the Belfast post-office.

Several persons in Clonmel have been prosecuted this week for sending letters through private hands instead of the post-office. A person is now on his tour through Ireland, laying informations on the subject, with the intention of recovering in each case the penalty of £20.

In the quarter ending 5th April, 1823, the sum of £25,288 19s. 10d. was paid duty on whiskey distilled in Cork, at 5s. 6d. British a gallon. This year, in the same quarter the sum of £26947 for whiskey, at 2s. British a gallon was paid.

Last night an order to stay the execution of Thomas Sullivan, until next Saturday, was received by the County Sheriff. At four o'clock this afternoon, Thomas Sheahan, who was tried on the same charge of Sullivan, for cutting the throat of Mr. Nagle, near Kilmallock, was hanged in front of the New Jail, and fully acknowledged the justice of his sentence.

This day Timothy Linehan is to be hanged, pursuant to sentence at Cork Assizes, on Thursday, for the murder of John Orpen, Constable of Police, near Kanturk, on the 7th December last. Charles and James Callaghan, and John Murphy, charged with the same, are acquitted.

At Cork assizes, since our last, Bartholomew Sullivan was convicted of assaulting Messrs. Cotter and Moss, with a view to intimidate them from giving testimony against shop-lifters from Fermoy, on Monday, and sentenced to pay a fine of £10, and to be confined three months. William Power, for uttering two forged notes, £1 10s. each, knowing them to be forged---Guilty. Michael Coghlan, for stealing a mule---Guilty. John Walshe, sheep-stealing---Guilty---to be transported for 7 years. John Guiry, for sheep-stealing---Guilty. George Armstrong for robbery---Guilty---to be transported seven years. William Ryan, for burglary, in the house of Mr. Land, at Youghal, is sentenced to be hanged; and Michael Regan, Michael Cotter and Patrick Cotter, for receiving articles stolen from Counsellor Fudge, at Youghal, are to be confined 12 months at hard labour.

A gang of coiners were yesterday convicted in the City Cork Court, and sentenced to seven years' transportation.

This day six men charged with the murder of the Franks' family, are to be tried at Cork—true bills having yesterday been found against them.

The men charged with murdering the Police at Churchtown, are to be tried on Tuesday.

In the County Cork Record Court, Paul Crowley v. John Townsend, Esq. of Clonakilty, for false imprisonment. Verdict for the plaintiff, £5 damages and 6d. costs.

In the *nisi prius* cause, Jones, a. Delanty, a verdict was had for Plaintiff, which is against the lease made by Mr. Wm. Martin, to Mr. D. Callaghan, of 200 acres of land, in trust, for Defendant.

The new City Cork Jail at Sunday's-well, is to be ready for the reception of prisoners in a fortnight. The building is highly approved of by Serjeant Lefroy.

This day, at three o'clock, two women named Moore and Dwyer, under rule of transportation, effected their escape from the City Jail.

Orders have been issued to build a barrack at Rathkeale, in this county, on the ground opposite the Abbey, to contain accommodations for 300 men.
