OUTRAGE AND REWARD.

AT a Meeting of Magistrates, Gentlemen, and others,
 held on the 20th of March, 1824, at SCARRIFF, in
 the County of Clare, to take into consideration the best
 mode of discovering, and bringing to punishment the Per-
 petrators of the dreadful Outrage committed on the person
 of PHILIP READE, of Woodpark, in the County of
 Galway, Esq. on the Night of Sunday, the 7th of March
 Instant.

The LORD BISHOP of KILLALOE in the Chair.
 Resolved—That we have felt it our duty to come forward
 on the present occasion, not only from the respect we bear to
 Mr. Reade personally, but because, though his residence is
 in the County of Galway, it is on the very borders of the
 County of Clare, of which County he is a Magistrate, and
 a considerable part of his property is in it.

Resolved—That a Subscription be entered into, for the
 purpose of procuring such information as may lead to the
 discovery and conviction of the Persons concerned in said
 Outrage, and that WILLIAM C. PURDON be requested to act
 as Treasurer.

Resolved—That we will pay to the Treasurer the several
 sums annexed to our names: one-fifth part thereof immedi-
 ately, and the remainder in the event of any of the Persons
 guilty of the said Felony, being prosecuted to conviction for
 the same, within twelve Calendar Months from this day.

Resolved—That Wm. C. Purdon, Cornelius O'Callaghan,
 John Burke, Esqrs. Rev. H. B. Huleatt, John Bindon, Esq.
 Chief Constable of Killaloe District, and R. Magan, Esq.
 Chief Constable of the Barony of Leitrim, in the County of
 Galway, be appointed a Committee, to carry into effect the
 object of this Meeting; and that for that purpose they shall
 have full controul over the Fund now in the Treasurer's
 hands, and likewise the power hereafter (in case any of the
 Offenders shall be prosecuted to conviction, within the time
 limited, as aforesaid,) to apportion and pay the intended
 Rewards, in such manner as to them or the majority of them
 shall seem fit.

 George O'Callaghan, Esq. being called thereto.

Resolved—That the thanks of the Meeting be given to the
