The letter following is the answer sent to Mr. Vesey Fitzgerald, Member for this County, to the representation made by him to the Government in England on the subject of the Linen Bounties, which it is proposed to withdraw, and contains the reply made by Mr. Herries, the Secretary of the Treasury, on the part of Lord Liverpool and Mr. Robinson, to the Memorial of the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of this County, which was presented to them by Mr. Fitzgerald:

Treasury Chambers, 20th March, 1824. Sir—I have laid before Lord Liverpool and the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Memorial of the Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Clare, which I had the honour of receiving from you, relating to the repeal of the existing Bounties upon Linen, payable in Ireland, and I am desired by them to acquaint you, that with every disposition to weigh with attention the opinions of so respectable a body, upon a subject with which they must be peculiarly conversant, his Lordship and Mr. Robinson are, nevertheless, fully convinced, that the measure which has been proposed to Parliament for removing those Bounties in ten years, by the slow gradation of a yearly diminution of one-tenth of their present amount, cannot have the injurious effects which the Sheriff and Grand Jury contemplate; and that the sound policy which dictates the ultimate abolition of such payments may thus be pursued without danger or detriment to the existing interests involved in the Irish Linen Trade. ### The Limerick Chronicle

Monday last, an old house in Jail-street, St. Francis's Abbey, fell with a tremendous crash, and buried Ellen Meade, the wife of the occupier, and her infant child, in the ruins. The circumstance having been immediately reported at the Exchange, the Mayor and Sir C. Marrett, with a party of the Police repaired to the spot and caused the materials to be removed; after searching for the bodies nearly an hour, the faint cry of the child was heard, and soon after the workmen discovered the cradle in which the infant was most providentially saved from injury, by a beam which fell across and sustained the impending weight; the mother was soon after found in rather a sitting posture, not far from the cradle, apparently dead, and dreadfully maimed in the head; the body was instantly removed to an open room, when medical assistance and all the measures recommended by the humane society were resorted to, but in vain, the vital spark having fled never to return. In the course of the day the Mayor held an inquest when the jury returned the following verdict: "Died of suffocation and wounds, in consequence of the falling of the house which she inhabited in Old Jail-street."

Sunday morning, the body of a female was perceived floating in the river, at the North Strand. An inquisition was held in the course of the day by the Mayor and a Coroner's Jury, before whom it appeared that the deceased was Ann M'Donnell, a cook, who lived in several respectable families; that latterly she exhibited signs of insanity, and in November last she attempted to drown herself in the Canal; her family missed her about three weeks; Under these circumstances the Jury returned a verdict that she drowned herself about the 8th of April, whilst in a state of insanity.

Yesterday, James Bennett, Esq. Coroner, held an Inquest on the body of Mr. George Hopkins, of Cahirconlish, in consequence of a report that Mr. Hopkins had died by poison: on the examination of Surgeon Franklin, jun. who opened the body, it appeared most satisfactorily that the deceased came by his death from excessive use of spirituous liquors.

Mr. B. B. Bradshaw, has, with others, offered a reward for the persons who burned the Out-Offices and Cows of his tenant Simon Ryan, at Atleen, County Tipperary, a few nights ago.

A reward is offered for Serjeant Pat Flynn, of the 31st Regiment, a native of Ballinakill, County Galway, who eloped from Dublin, with Regimental money, a few days since.

The Postmasters General have offered £100 reward, for the apprehension of each of the persons who attacked the Dublin Coach to Cork, on the 18th inst. and took off the Dublin Bags and bye Letters for Mitchelstown and Fermoy.

We have seen a letter from a Medical Gentleman in Cashel, which states that the driver and guard of the coach are in a fair way of recovery, and no amputation has taken place. Mr. Ferguson, from the General Post Office, has arrived there to investigate the transaction.

Several Out-Offices and eight head of Cattle with Corn, were maliciously consumed at Boherrard, Queen's County, on Saturday last.

The sentence of death on 13 men at Cork, is commuted to transportation. There are none under sentence of death in the County Jail at present, and in consequence the gallows, which has been standing since the commencement of last Assizes, has been taken down; seven men were executed.

portant, which was, the state of several houses in the Old Town, one of which, even on Monday, had buried a poor female in its ruins. He therefore impressed it upon the Jury, as a duty, to inspect these houses without delay, and he pledged himself that the Bench would give effect to their recommendation.

The Mayor impressed upon the Market Jury the necessity of assisting him in putting down forestallers; in frequently visiting the markets, and seeing that none but wholesome food be exhibited for sale, and that the weights of the different buyers and vendors should be constantly examined.

Several bills of indictment and witnesses were sent to the Grand Jury; after which the Court adjourned for trials to the 7th of June.

The Grand Jury have appointed to meet to-morrow, at the Court House, at twelve o'clock, for the purpose of proceeding through the City, and inspecting such houses as are in a dilapidated state, with a view to have them forthwith prostrated. As the Jury can only form an opinion from the external appearance of these buildings, and as many houses are internally in a dangerous state, and threaten destruction to the occupiers, persons who can give information to the Jury of such cases, will also do well to attend them on their inspection.

The following were convicted at the Sessions of Rathkeale, before the Assistant Barrister, last week:—John Savage and Patrick Boyse, riot and assault, the former to six months imprisonment and hard labour, the latter two months imprisonment, and hard labour. Bryan O'Neill, assault, same sentence. Thomas Connors and John Wall, riot and assault, wherein the prosecutor, John Dore, lost an eye; the former 7 months imprisonment and hard labour, the latter six months and to pay prosecutor five pounds.—Timothy Keating and Cornelius Keating, riot and assault, three months imprisonment and hard labour. John Madigan, assault, two months imprisonment and hard labour. Wm. Buttimer, riot and assault, confined to hard labour for a fortnight. James Roberts, Francis Evans, and Edward Switzer, for assault, to be imprisoned for a fortnight, and give security to keep the peace. Wm. Carter, for assault, to be discharged on paying prosecutor five pounds.

"Resolved—That the thanks of this Grand Jury are due, and are hereby given to Mr. John Kiely, for the prompt and efficient aid he afforded the Gentry, Magistrates, and Nobility of this County, whilst he was employed as Secretary and Chief Constable, under the Peace Preservation Act; and though we regret his recent removal to another County, we entertain a sanguine hope his zeal and ability will ultimately procure him promotion, as the just reward of his meritorious services."

On Saturday, a Court of Special Sessions under the Insurrection Act, was held at Six-mile-bridge, County Clare, pursuant to adjournment, before Mr. Blackburne and Mr. Scott. There were twenty-five Magistrates present, and the following persons were arraigned:—Daniel Broggy, sen. and Daniel Broggy, jun. for being absent from their dwellings, and for having ammunition in their possession, which they refused to deliver up; the prisoners were, after a full investigation, acquitted, as was Michael Hickey, in custody on a similar charge. John Buckley, John Minogue, Roger Garvey, Daniel, David, and Patrick Flannery, were severally tried for being absent from their houses at illegal hours, and acquitted. In the case of John Minogue, a witness, named John Logan, was fined £5, for contempt in evincing a reluctance to identify the prisoner, with whom, it appeared, he was acquainted. James Haneen was put forward, for being absent from his house at Cratloe, after the prescribed hours, and being unable to account for himself in any satisfactory manner, he was convicted and sentenced to seven years transportation. He is ordered to be detained in our Jail.

The following Magistrates attended the Special Sessions at Six-mile-bridge, on Saturday last:— Sir Edward O'Brien, Bart. M. P., Edward Scott, Assistant Barrister; Major G. Warburton, Captain Drought, Bindon Blood, Thomas Studdert, J. S. Vandeleur, Colonel O'Donnell, Thomas Browne, Major Colpoys, Henry Butler, Donat O'Brien, Francis Spaight, William Scott, Burton Bindon, Sir John Elley, Samuel Bindog, Thomas Mabon, John Singleton, Rev. James Martin, and William Bentley.

In reporting Mr. Blackburne's speech at the Sessions, on Thursday, we should have stated that the Baronies most likely to be relieved from the Insurrection Act, are Coonagh, Ownybeg, and Clanwilliam, which have been remarkably peaceable.

There were no convictions under the Insurrection Act, at Cork, on Friday and Saturday.

We can state from authority, that the Field Exercise and Evolutions of the army only to be issued at present under the direction of the Adjutant-General of the Force; short, Regiments can only be supplied through their Agents.

No Brevet, we understand, will take place at present.

The 2d Regiment of Foot has received orders to march from Athlone to Dublin for the purpose of embarking for England.

The 58th Regiment have arrived at Clontarf to do duty.

The 34th Regiment are to do duty at Athlone; they are daily expected in Dublin.

Twenty-five recruits enlisted here for the 97th and 98th Regiments, marched hence on Sunday, for Cork.

A General Order is now in circulation addressed to Colonels and Commanding Officers of Regiments. Upon reference to the old regulations for the purchase, sale, and exchange of Regimental Commissions, we find that forms of applications for the sale and purchase of Commissions, which prescribed a certificate signed by the parties, that no sum beyond that limited by his Majesty's Regulations would be demanded or accepted, are cancelled, and the following parts are new:—"Officers retiring upon the half-pay and receiving the difference forfeit all claim to further rank or employment to the pension for their widows, and to compensation allowance for their children, unless they repay the difference upon being allowed to come in again upon the rank in which they retired, but they forfeit their progressive rank during the period of their retirement."

The Report at the United Service Club that the "People of the Horse Guards" mean to continue the 10th Hussars in Ireland for another year, as a punishment for their sins.

Payment to half-pay officers of the Army, due on the 31st of March, will be issued in London, on the 3d of May.

A local Bank is to be formed at Galway, where 10 per cent. is now charged for discounts.

An order has been issued by a Revenue Board stating, if any of their Officers get credit and will not pay their debts, that they shall be instantly dismissed.

In the New Times an advertisement appears from the Chancellor of the Exchequer acknowledging the receipt of £1600 from a person unknown, purporting to be an arrears of income duty unintentionally omitted to be paid.

The speech of that useful and resident Nobleman, Lord Carbery, on the state of Ireland, has been misrepresented in some of the London Papers, which reported that his Lordship said, "that the Irish Gentry consider the Insurrection Act as a benefit to the country." Now the fact is, his Lordship never said a word on the subject of the Insurrection Act, either to convey any opinion of his own, much less to give the opinion of others, without authority. What his Lordship said related to the Constabulary Act, and was in substance, that that Act had worked well; that the Police formed under it were a well conducted efficient body, who did their duty with activity, and at the same time with humanity; and that as far as came to his knowledge, they were generally appointed by the Magistracy.

Petitions are about to be presented to the House of Commons, against the measure proposed by Mr. Huskisson, of taking bonded foreign wheat out of the King's stores, and replacing same with a given quantity of flour-- which measure, it is conceived, if allowed to pass, will throw about one-third the quantity of foreign wheat now in bond into consumption, to the manifest injury of the agricultural interest, as well as of the Merchants, who made their purchases of Grain upon the faith of Laws enacted for their protection. Petitions against the present mode of making Corn Returns, which is greatly open to fraud, will also be presented.

Over one hundred men were set to work on Monday morning, at opening a street from Corbally Bridge, through the Abbey to Bridge-street—this is an avenue that must be of great importance to that part of the City, and when Kennedy's Bridge, at Corbally, is completed, which eventually follows it will give the Doonans and the northern districts of Clare, a most desirable and quick approach to the center of the City.

On Friday the County Galway Match will take place near Loughrea. Daly, M. P. gives five premiums.

There is every appearance that the hours of despatching the provincial mails from Waterford will shortly be changed, so as to correspond with the time at which the British mail now arrives by means of the Steam Packets—that is in the evening. The Cork and Limerick Coaches are likely to travel by night.

A good deal has been said about the Sessions at Limerick, but at the Assizes of Yorkwick, just finished, 35 persons were sentenced to death, and a list of names too numerous to mention, sentenced for transportation.

The County Tipperary Quarter-Session commenced at Cashel on Monday last.
