**LINEN BOARD GRANTS.**

THE TRUSTEES, being anxious to excite a spirit of  
 individual exertion in aid of their own efforts, and to  
 extend the beneficial effects of their Grants as widely as  
 possible, have determined that they will not pay more than  
 ONE-HALF of the value of any Wheel, Reel, Loom, or  
 Hackle, to be granted by them for the future; nor will they  
 pay that half, unless, PREVIOUS to the time of its being de-  
 manded, it shall be proved to them, by the production of  
 one of those documents duly perfected, which is called an  
 UTENSIL-PAPER, that the Wheel, Reel, Loom, or Hackle, so  
 granted, has been well and truly made of good and sound  
 materials, and is well worth the sum described in such Paper,  
 and that the Inspector of the County had viewed, and exam-  
 ined, and branded such Utensil, and that ONE-HALF of  
 the value of such Utensil had been actually paid to the Arti-  
 fier, and that such Utensil was then in the possession of the  
 Grantee. All these things must appear to have been done,  
 BEFORE the REMAINING HALF of the value will be paid by  
 the Trustees. UTENSIL PAPERS can always be had gratis,  
 by application to any of the Inspectors-General, or any of  
 the County Inspectors, or at the Linen Office, Dublin.

LOCAL COMMITTEES and ASSOCIATIONS have been formed  
 in several parts of Ireland, particularly in the South and  
 West of the Country, for promoting different Branches of  
 Industry connected with the Linen Manufacture; and it is  
 through these Associations the Trustees wish to distribute  
 Utensils, rather than by granting them to individuals:  
 because it is reasonable to expect, that such Committees and

 Manufacture over which they preside. Where such Associa-  
 tions exist, any individual who may think himself, or  
 herself, a fit object of Bounty, should apply, in the first  
 instance, to that Body, whose business it will be to forward  
 such Application, if approved of by them, to the Inspector-  
 General; and where no such Body has yet been formed, the  
 Trustees will the more approve of this course of proceeding,  
 if in any such case it shall lead to the establishment of such  
 Committees and Associations.

**DEATHS.**

At nine o'clock yesterday morning, at his house in Upper  
 Glentworth-street, Captain R. W. Parker, of the Royal  
 Navy. This lamented Gentleman was a native of the  
 County of Cork, and had been residing in this City for some  
 years past. While on service, he was equally conspicuous  
 for his courage as an Officer, and his humanity as a man.  
 Before he had even finished his time as a Midshipman, he was  
 made a Lieutenant, for his heroic conduct. He was the  
 friend and companion of Lord Cochrane, with whom he  
 performed one of the most brilliant achievements recorded  
 in our naval annals, when his Lordship commanded the  
 Speedy, which captured the La Gama. When the account  
 of that celebrated action reached the Admiralty, their Lord-  
 ships were startled at the inequality of the force, and the  
 almost unparalleled glory of the victory. The Speedy was  
 but a sloop of war, with about 70 men, and 16 guns; the  
 La Gama was a Spanish frigate, carrying 44 guns, with a  
 crew of 350 men. After the Speedy had exhausted her am-  
 munition, she locked her rigging in that of the La Gama,  
 which was boarded by Lord Cochrane and Captain Parker,  
 (then his Lordship's first Lieutenant,) who, with the brave  
 men that followed them, fought on the Spanish deck until  
 they carried the frigate. Lord Cochrane and Captain Parker  
 were promoted during the Fox Administration; and the then  
 Lords of the Admiralty appointed Captain Parker to the  
 command of the Rain-bow, which was represented to be  
 fitting out at Bermuda, to which station he repaired; but  
 that ship not being prepared, he returned home, and retired,  
 on half-pay. He was generally known as "the gallant  
 Captain Parker." A liver complaint caused his demise. He  
 was an affectionate husband, a fond parent, and a sincere  
 friend. With the simplicity of innocence he united the  
 intrepidity of heroism. No honest man ever lived, and no  
 braver ever died. He has left an affectionate wife and  
 family to deplore his loss.  
 On Sunday last, after a few hours illness, at Forest Lodge,  
 Queen's County, sincerely and deservedly lamented by his  
 afflicted family and numerous friends, John Hawkesworth,  
 Esq. It is not too much to say his philanthropy was pure—  
 for it was founded on true Christianity.
