The Constabulary Act to be introduced into

On Saturday, a numerous meeting of the Co.  
Westmeath Magistrates assembled at Mullingar,  
the Marquis Westmeath in the Chair, when 100  
of the former Police and 92 able and efficient

Yesterday, John Bulbridge, Myles Cassidy,  
and Catherine Salmon, youngsters, convicted at  
our City Assizes and sentenced to 7 years trans-  
portation, which Judge Torrens humanely had  
commuted to imprisonment in the Dublin Peni-  
tentiary, were forwarded to their destination by  
the day-coach; they were comfortably attired in  
the regulation dress, procured by Inspector  
Gibson.

Yesterday evening, the Mayor held an inquest  
at the Hospital of the New Grenadier  
body of Corporal John Cloviac, of the Gren-  
adier Company of the 1st Royals, who put a  
period to his existence, by discharging a loaded  
musquet at his body, the contents of which  
lodged in his left breast; the unfortunate man  
survived the act some hours, and died without

relate, Matt M'Namara of Mary-street, and  
Mary O'Meara, were drowned---the former 22,  
and the latter 18 years of age. The Mayor  
held an inquest on the bodies---Verdict---  
Accidentally drowned.

last night, near Cratloe. The Mayor has sent  
persons to bring up the body, when an inquest  
will be held.
