A large comfortable farm-house, situate on the lands of Ballysimon, in the Liberties of this City, part of the estate of W. H. Armstrong, Esq. was maliciously burnt to the ground last night. The premises were only surrendered yes- terday by the defaulting tenant, to whom large arrears were forgiven.

Yesterday, Winifred Callaghan, a widow and mother of four children, died in the County Infirmary, where she was received on the 15th of April; it was adduced in evidence, before an inquisition taken by the Mayor, in the after- noon, that the deceased was bit by a dog at Mungret, where she had gone to purchase pota- toes; the wound from the bite increased to such a degree, that a mortification put a period to the sufferings of the unfortunate woman, and the Jury returned a verdict, that her death was caused by the wound received from the dog.— It is hoped that this sad calamity will cause the owners of dogs to have them logged. The Mayor, in his bailiwick, is determined to inflict the full penalty prescribed by law, and in this instance has caused the possessor of the dog to be fined, and the animal destroyed; the penalty was handed to young Callaghan.

Yesterday a female servant, named Considine, being charged by her master, in Market-alley, with having robbed him, in a fit of irritation cut her throat with a razor; she lies under the care of Surgeon Franklin, who has hopes of her recovery.

Thursday night, Daniel O'Connor, mill- wright, was violently assaulted in Roche's-street, by a number of men, who left him so reduced that his death is expected. Two of the princi- pals, named O'Donnell and Guinness, were yesterday fully committed by the Mayor for trial at the Assizes.
