was subdued. The name of the fellow is John Ringwood;
he turns out to be a daring and noted character, who was
not long ago flogged at Rathdowney. After a long fight
nearly in the dark, with guns, pistols, bayonets and fists,
two more of the intruders were secured, Patrick Maher and
Michael Mara. The three prisoners are wounded, Maher
rather severely in the head; the fourth, taking advantage
of the darkness of the scene, made his way out of the house.
At day-light, Lieut. Wray and his party took the three pris-
oners, well secured in a car, to Borris, whence they were
committed to the county jail, at Maryborough. We cannot
close, without saying that Lieut. Wray is justly entitled to
all imaginable credit for the promptness with which he met
and parried the danger that threatened a most respectable
gentleman; for the judgment with which he distributed
through the house his little force, consisting of himself, his
policemen, Mr. Dowling and a few others of the household;
and, to crown all, for the coolness with which he executed
his well concerted project. He received no injury in the
struggle; his imminent danger we have already noticed.—
Two of the Police were wounded, slightly. A serious play
is generally followed by a farce. The prisoners, when dis-
armed, tied, and admitted to parley, denied all intention of
robbery. They merely wanted a drink of water! For so
trifling an object they certainly exhibited great courage.

On Sunday night last, a very neat Cottage
lately occupied by Mrs. Clear, on the lands of
Scart, the property of W. H. Armstrong, Esq.
in the South Liberties of this City, was entirely
consumed by fire; the former tenants were
evicted in February last; Mr. Shine had taken
it, and got possession about two weeks before,
and had a man in care whose family had a most
narrow escape. This is the second malicious
burning on the same lands within the last week,
and in both instances Captain Drought's Police
were instantly on the spot, and most active in
endeavouring to discover the perpetrators.—
Mr. Shine has offered a reward of fifty pounds
for the apprehension of the perpetrators.

Three out-houses at Labasheeda, County
Clare, were burned on Friday night.

The Mayor held an inquisition at the Infir-
mary, on John Casey, who died on Friday
night—after the fullest investigation, the jury
returned a verdict, "that he was wilfully mur-
dered at Cahirconlish, in the afternoon of Mon-
day last." The Mayor immediately issued his
warrant for the apprehension of the perpetrators,
all of whom are known; one of them named
Birmingham has since been lodged in jail, and
from the exertions making, there is no doubt but
his companions cannot long elude justice.

Effects of Drinking to excess—Yesterday
morning, Thomas Barron, a Master Cooper,
was found a corpse, in the hall of his house, in
Play-house-lane. The Mayor held an inquest,
and the jury decided, "that he died by the
visitation of God; and that at the time of his
decease, he was in a state of intoxication."

prosecuted the murderers of Mr. Hoskins, left
this City, on Monday, with much regret, as he
was obliged to be placed by constraint on board
the vessel which will take his precious person to
America. The Government are entitled to every
praise for removing him and other equally atro-
cious characters from perambulating our streets,
which they have been in the habit of doing for
some months.

The Hope Smuggler, captured by the Pelorus,
has discharged 520 bales of Tobacco, at
the King's Stores, Cork.

The Bishop of Derry held his annual visita-
tion on Thursday; all the Clergy were present
to whom an excellent sermon was preached by
Archdeacon Monsell. The fund for relief of
the widows of Clergy belonging to the diocese
amounts now to £5,405 10s 6d—from this fund
fourteen widows receive £30 6s 8d a-year
and several of them are housed and clothed.

The health of the Lord Bishop of Cork makes
it necessary that he should go to England for
some time; in consequence, the Visitation will
not be held in September, as had been originally
intended.

The Lord Bishop of Cork has given the Living
of Aghadown to the Rev. Joseph Wright, suc-
cessor to the late Incumbent; and the Union of Cap-
land and Kilcoe to the Rev. John Jagoe. Both these
Gentlemen had been Curates within his Diocese.

The Rev. Simon Jos. Harrigan, Prior of the
Irish Dominican Convent, is shortly expected
from Rome to his Chapel; in this City; he has
had two audiences of the Pope, by whom he
has been graciously received; and he has been
paid the most marked attention by the English
at Rome, particularly by the Marquis of Hastings
and Sir William Gerard.
