**COMMISSIONERS OF CHARITABLE
 DONATIONS AND BEQUESTS.**

WHEREAS the pious intentions of many persons are
 frequently defeated by the concealment, or misap-
 plication, of their Donations, or Bequests to public or pri-
 vate Charities in Ireland, and by the Act of the 3d year of
 the Reign of his late Majesty King George the 3d, c. 18,
 entitled "An Act for the better Discovery of Charitable
 Donations and Bequests," it is, among other things enacted,
 "That every Person, or Persons, to whom the Probate of
 any Will or Letters of Administration should be granted,
 should, three Months after obtaining the same, publish in
The Dublin Gazette three times successively, an Account
 of every Charitable Donation and Bequest contained
 therein, under the penalty of Fifty Pounds, to be recovered
 by any Person who shall sue for the same."

Now, this is to give notice, to all *Executors* and *Admi-
 nistrators* who have obtained Probates of such Wills, and
 have not published the prescribed Accounts of Charities so
 bequeathed, that it is in contemplation to *adopt effectual
 proceedings* against all *Executors* or *Administrators*, who
 shall be found liable to the penalties of Fifty Pounds in
 each case, for having neglected, and still persisting in doing
 so, or for hereafter neglecting to make the before-mentioned
 publications in *The Dublin Gazette* accordingly.

The Vicars-General, or their Surrogates, and the Register
 of the Prerogative, are hereby *required, forthwith, to
 transmit to the Secretary of this Board, their Annual Re-
 turns of every Charitable Donation and Bequest contained
 in any Wills entered in their respective Offices.*
 Communications in aid of the recovery of concealed,
 misapplied, or suppressed Charities, are to be addressed to
 the Secretary of this Board.
