prove such clergymen unworthy to enjoy the benefits of the former, and unfit to discharge the functions of the latter.

Resolved - Supposing that some Clergymen who promised to procure the surrender of arms, did not, in point of fact, perform that promise, to infer from that a predetermination to deceive the proper Authorities, appears to us a precipitate and unwarranted conclusion; the punctuality of a Clergyman in cases of this kind must necessarily depend upon the sincerity of others, and his failure ought, in justice, be attributed to the violation of a pledge which he had himself received and implicitly relied on.

Resolved - That the loyalty and active zeal of the Catholic Clergy of this County have been admitted and eulogized by the Judges on the Bench-ncknowledged by the Newspapers, not at all partial to our religion or politics, and placed beyond the reach of reasonable doubt, by the numerous stands of arms which, even in the heat and rage of the public disturbances, were, through the advice and visible instrumentality of the Catholic Clergy, surrendered to the authorities of the land.

Resolved-That our body necame in the highest degree obnoxious to those whose excesses they were labouring to check-that many were exposed to great personal danger, and were compelled by the fiercest threats even to abandon their houses at night to escape from the fury which their loyal and persevering exertions had excited.

Resolved-That the extent and value of those exertions have been admitted by Major Wilcocks himself, and we are prepared to prove by unimpeachable testimony, his having declared that it would be impossible to live securely in the County of Limerick, were it not for the zeal and influence of the Catholic Clergy

Resolved-That we conceive our loyalty as a Body to be incontrovertibly established by those facts, and we call upon Major Wilcocks to name, if he can, those individuals amongst us, who "meant to deceive him or other Authorities, and whose conduct has not been for the peace of the Country." Should be think proper to decline this, we are persuaded that his opinion shall not deprive its of the esteem of a single just and candid man in society,

Resolved-That we consider it at once impolitic and unjust to impeach the loyalty of a Body of Men, whose office is to interpose between the passions of the people and the severe, however necessary, enactments of the law - Such a proceeding holds up this mediating class as subjects of distrust to the Government, and of hostility and scorn to every man who thinks himself loyal-it unfeelingly aggravates the hardships of their state, by adding the suspicion of the ruling power to the vengeance of the seditious to whom it must be a kind of triumph, to behold their most zealous opponents, branded as disloyal, by the agents of that identical authority, which those Clergymen continue to uphold against all the combinations of, the misguided.

Resolved-That as in the discharge of our said duties, we have not courted the approbation of men, we shall never be discouraged by their censure- loyalty with us is not a calculating principle but a solemn duty-the result, the conviction, and the dictate of conscience; and however misrepresented we may be, we hope, as the Apostle exhorts, 2d cap. 6th and 8th verse, "to exhibit ourselves as the Ministers of God, in much patience, in labours, in watching, through honour and dishonour, through infamy and good name, assinners yet speaking the truth,"-and we are resolved, by word and example, to enforce the blessings of peace and social order and subordination to the Laws of the Land.

Resolved-That we feel deeply indebted to the Catholic Association, for their promptitude in coming forward on this and other occasions, to vindicate our Body from Calumny.
