On Friday night last, four houses, the pro-
perty of a poor man named Timothy Keohane,
were set fire to and consumed, on the lands of
Laheragh, within four miles of Skibbereen.

Last night a melancholy accident occurred at
Bruff. A young Gentleman, who had just re-
turned from fowling, placed his gun in the
corner of a room, and left the apartment; a boy,
of twelve years old, took up the gun, and pre-
sented it at another child, when it unfortunately
went off, and lodged the contents in the abdo-
men—he died in three minutes after.

On Saturday night, a man in the last pangs of
life was found on the road outside the Lodge at
Newcastle, to which he was immediately brought,
and every effort to continue animation proved
ineffectual; it appeared in evidence before the
Mayor, who held an inquest at Ballyclough on
Sunday, that the unfortunate deceased was
named John Halloran, and that he drank spi-
rituous liquors to excess, which caused suffoca-
tion, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly.

A dispute happened on Sunday morning be-
tween James O'Connor, a brush-maker, and
Charles Fitzgerald, a carpenter's apprentice

when O'Connor received a blow on a part
from Fitzgerald under the ribs in the left side;
O'Connor is despaired of, and Fitzgerald, with
his mother who joined in the fray, are lodged
in Jail. A brother of O'Connor, who was also
engaged, had his left hand dreadfully mangled.

Yesterday evening a decent tradesman named
John Kennedy, was violently assaulted at
Garryowen, by one Tracy, a butcher, who at-
tacked him desperately in the head with a stone, and
otherwise ill treated him.

On Thursday last a soldier of the 26th foot,
stationed at Skibbereen, was drowned in the
river, where he and his comrade had gone to
bathe.

A Serjeant of Police has been reduced to the
ranks—a private dismissed, and another Private
fined by the Magistracy of Wicklow, for per-
mitting a prisoner in their custody to drink to
