On Sunday evening a number of people, re-
turning from the Pattern, usually held in
Croom on the 15th of August, fell out amongst
each other, when Michael O'Neill received a
blow of a stone on the head, of which he ex-
pired in the course of the night. His brother
was also severely beaten, and two others, all in
a dangerous way. An Inquest had been held
on the body of O'Neill, by James Bennett, Esq.
and a respectable Jury, at which Surgeon Frank-
lin attended. Two men in the neighbourhood
have fled, who were seen in the act of beating

William O'Brien, a labourer, dropped sud-
