The 39th will not, it is supposed, leave this for Buttevant for about three weeks;---their very much improved state of discipline, under Lieut.-Colonel Lindesay, C. B. has lately called forth the highest eulogium from Major-General Sir John Elley, K. C. B.

Sir John Elley is on a tour, inspecting the detachments of the 25th Regiment in the County Clare.

Lord Combermere will, in his tour through the Country, visit Rockbarton, the hospitable mansion of the Lord Chief Baron, in this County.

Four transports, with troops to act against the Burmese, left Bombay on the 26th April last.

The 13th 38th and 41st Regiments, form a part of the expedition against the Burmese.

Colonel Sir Archibald Campbell, K. C. B. of his Majesty's 38th Regiment of Foot, to command the Bengal detachment of the army destined to act against the Burmese nation, with the rank of Brigadier-General.

The 97th Regiment of Foot is ordered to Ceylon, and will embark in the next fleet for that country, at Portsmouth.

The Bridge Commissioners, yesterday, received a letter from Mr. Secretary Gregory, acknowledging their invitation to the Lord Lieutenant to lay the first stone of the building, but his Excellency has not yet fixed any period for his visit.
