*Apprehension of a Swindler.*—The following is a well dressed fashionable looking gentleman, going by the name and address of Esq. of Sligo, but whose real name is from the County Tyrone, went to Mr. White's in Patrick-street, and ordered a parcel of Handkerchiefs and Stockings, two dozen linen, lots of thread, needles &c. to be ordered to be sent to 'Mr. White,' at the Hotel.
