Last night, a farm-house was burned on the
lands of Oulagh, in this County.

On Thursday night last a party of armed men
attacked several houses belonging to industrious
farmers and labourers at Inchafune, near Dun-
manway, and after behaving in a riotous manner
to the inmates, threatened them with instant
death, in the event of their affording any assist-
ance to Mrs. Jagoe, in the recovery of her rents,
which were due to a large amount. They then
carried off a quantity of corn and some cattle,
that were distrained; and also cut down several
young trees that were growing on the lands.

A quantity of gun-powder was found in a
house in Scariff, last week; the owner has been
held to bail.

A fine young boy named Thomas Sexton, who
was received into the County Infirmary, last
week, after being accidentally rolled over by a
jaunting-car at the Races, died on Sunday. An
Inquest was held same day on the body, and the
Jury returned a verdict accordingly.

An Inquest was also held on the body of John
Madigan, on Sunday, who died in the County

Jury, after viewing the body and hearing evi-
dence, found a verdict of *Wilful Murder* against
some person or persons unknown. The deceased
on being conveyed to the Infirmary was speech-
less, and could give no information as to who
injured him.

John Toomy, a young lad, a coach-smith, had
been this week apprehended by the City Police
under a warrant from the Mayor of Cork,
charged with having robbed his uncle of a quan-
tity of wearing apparel.

he had sold a parcel of corn. The fraud was
effected by another person, who represented him
at the Merchant's office, to whom the money
was paid, and who immediately absconded.

The two Kerry Cows, stopped in this City
