Daniel Greenshaw, a boy about 14 days old, died last week at Ashton, Under-line, from the remony of circumcision being performed on him by Mr. Henry Lees, of the same place, who is a follower of Johanna Southcote, which sects have adopted the Mosalic Law in this respect. An Inquest was held on the body, and a verdict of manslaughter returned.

John Russell, a Coach-maker, near sixty years old, hanged himself, on Friday.

Oats at Frankfort have risen in price, owing to the opening of the English Ports.

The Pope has consecrated three Sees—at St. Louis, at Detroit, and at Vincennes in America.

Mr. Edwards, Proprietor of the Newspaper at the Cape of Good Hope, has been sentenced to seven years transportation, to Botany Bay, for libelling Lord Charles Somerset.

Captain H. Christian is appointed, with the rank of Commodore, to succeed Commodore Course, in the command at the Cape of Good Hope.

The Vandeleur and Nepean, Revenue Cutters, from Ireland, have arrived at Devonport, to refit; and the Genoa of 80 guns, Sir T. Livingstone, is to be paid off.

By the new Naval regulations, a full allowance of provisions is to be served to soldiers when embarked in transports or men of war, instead of two-thirds as allowed heretofore, and the women and children of soldiers are to have one-quarter rations.

By letters received in town from Naples, we regret to state, that a Gentleman, once nearly connected with the County of Dublin, as its Representative in Parliament, has committed suicide. The fatal act was accomplished by penetrating the carotid artery with a pen-knife. Pecuniary embarrassment is said to be the immediate cause of this fatal act.

Upwards of 100 Priests attended at the Grand Office and High Mass, performed at Townshend street Chapel, for the repose of the soul of the late King of France.

The Mayor held a Coroner's inquest, yesterday, on the body, by which the system of these barbarous savages was completely elucidated; and we hope that the Meeting called by his Worship, for Tuesday next, will entirely extinguish this illegal band, who, if suffered longer to exist, will blight the corn trade in this district, as no person will be found to bring Country produce to market, where a probability of the loss of life may be the consequence.

Some of the murderers of M'Mahon are known—they have fled from hence, but measures are adopted for their apprehension.

The Mayor has directed the Police to patrol the different avenues, in order to protect the farmer from the interference of the Corn Brokers.

Yesterday, the Mayor lodged in Jail, Thomas Shields and John Liston, two Corn Brokers, on a charge of being concerned in attacking John Dwyer of Ballybriggan, who would not suffer his corn to be sold by them.

The Magistrates of this County are to meet at the County Court House, on Tuesday next, the 12th inst. being the first day of the General Quarter Sessions, for the division of Limerick, on some particular point of public affairs.

On Wednesday night last, Thomas O'Neil, driver of the Limerick and Waterford Mail Coach, having an altercation with his wife in Clonmel, gave her some blows of a stick of which she died. The unfortunate man was the first to make known the dreadful catastrophe, and surrendered himself. The wife was much addicted to drunkenness. A Coroner's Inquest was held on the body—Verdict, wilful murder.

On Wednesday, the Mayor re-assembled the Jury impanelled on Sunday, to ascertain how Patt O'Mealy, of Black-Boy, who died in the County Infirmary on that day, came by his death, when the Jury, after a mature investigation retired, and after three hours deliberation, returned the following verdict:—"That Patrick O'Mealy came to his death at Singland, returning from the Race Course, by a blow of a stone inflicted on the left side of his head, by John O'Donnell, aided and assisted by Thomas O'Donnell, James Hayes, and Michael Falvey." Three of the latter are fully committed by the Mayor to jail, for trial at the Assizes.

Maurice Molony, a slater, fell nearly 30 feet from the new buildings at the Castle Barrack, yesterday, and is considered to be dangerously injured. The scaffolding on which he was supported gave way, and he was precipitated to the ground. This poor man has been particularly unfortunate, as he received two most desperate falls before the present occurrence.

A young man, named Timothy Sullivan, was killed at a dancing-house near Ennis, on Sunday, by Michael James, who has absconded.

At a hurling match in Burren, on Sunday, William Kerin was mortally wounded by Daniel Callaghan.

James Connell was shot dead by a military party, near Kildorrery, who were called out to quell a riot at Ahacross fair, on Tuesday.

On Wednesday night, a valuable Cow was stolen, from the King's Island, the property of Mr. Rahilly.

The Mare stolen from Mr. Watson of Gort, advertised in our last, has been recovered, and the thief arrested through the activity of Mr. Thomas Benson, High Constable of this City.

Eight Convicts, from Galway, arrived in town yesterday, under an escort of the 25th Regiment, from Ennis, and were this morning forwarded from the County Jail, to Cork, for transportation, under a Military Guard.

Dennis Murphy, were discharged from custody, as counsel on the part of Murphy, did not consider it advisable to prosecute.

Daniel Leary, a sailor, was indicted for an assault on Catherine Raleigh. This affair was settled by the recommendation of the Court.

Michael and Roger Kennans were indicted for an assault on Michael Magrath and Thomas Bradshaw. The assault was satisfactorily proved to be one of a most aggravated nature. The prisoners were sentenced to one month's imprisonment, and hard labour.

Edmond O'Brien, Edmond Keenan, and Mary Egan were indicted for assaulting Thomas Doyle. The female prisoner was convicted, and sentenced to a week's imprisonment, and to give security to keep the peace for five years; the other two were acquitted, but ordered by the Court to find bail, themselves in £10 each, and two sureties in £5 each, to keep the peace for the space of five years.

Denis Sexton for an assault on Edmond Dwyer, was acquitted.

Eleven noted offenders, mostly females, and of a certain class, were discharged by Proclamation; the bills were ignored against nine, and two for want of prosecution.

The Court was then adjourned to the 26th of October.

On Thursday, 110 men of the 1st Royal Veteran Battalion, under Captain Heaviside, arrived here from Galway, on a route to replace the 29th at Bantry, Whiddy Island, and Bear Island; the head-quarters of the 1st Veteran Battalion remain at Galway.

A battalion of the Veterans is to be sent to Gibraltar, and another to Canada.

The 25th and 43d Regiments are the next in Ireland for foreign service.

The entire of the 41st, 54th, and 59th Regiments have left Madras, for the Burmese country; the first division is commanded by Lieutenant-Colonel M'Bean, 54th; the 2d by Lieut.-Colonel Smelt, 41st.

Captain Priestley, 25th Regiment, has arrived at Six-mile-Bridge, to replace Captain Holles of the same Regiment, who is ordered with his company to head quarters at Ennis.

Major-General Sir John Cameron, has issued a Garrison Order, dated Devonport, highly complimentary to the 2d Battalion 3d Guards.

His Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief, with his Grace the Duke of Wellington, and a numerous Staff, reviewed the troops composing the Garrison of Chatham, on Thursday, viz.—the 2d or Queen's, Major Williams; 7th Royal Fusileers, Colonel Sir Edward Blakeney; the Royal Marines, Colonel Tremanhere; 57th Regiment, Lieut.-Colonel Carey; 60th Royal American Rifles, and Royal Sappers and Miners, under Colonel Wylly, Royal Fusileers.

The 48th Regiment, under Lieut.-Colonel Cemitiere, has sailed from Van Dieman's Land for Madras.

The 1st Battalion of the 60th Royal American Rifle Corps, marched from Chatham, on Wednesday, for Canterbury.
