The Corporation of Dublin have lately added to their rents £3000 a year.

It is stated, that a considerable reduction in the salaries of the Police Magistrates, will take place. The Earl O'Neill is dangerously indisposed. The Archbishop of Dublin and family have died in town.

On Saturday the meeting of the Roman Catholic Association was held at the Exhibition, Royal Arcade. There are two doors of entrance, one for spectators on the left of the entrance to the Arcade after ascending the steps; the other door for the members, where a porter stands, is from the gallery of the Arcade. The singing-room is situated immediately behind the lodge-room of the Grand Orange Lodge of the Roman Catholic Association on Saturday.

Mr. O'Connell produced a debenture of five per cent. Stock for £1000 Catholic Rent, intended to be funded in the name of David O'Connell, Cornelius M'Loughlin, and Nicholas O'Connell, Esqrs. Treasurers of the Catholic Rent.

It would move that another thousand be vested in the same week. On the motion of Mr. O'Connell, the Register and the London "Truth" were ordered for the use of the Association.

Mr. Harcourt Lees arrived at the Black-rock, London, on Wednesday. The worthy gentleman came express to attend a Meeting of the Executive Body on the following day.

Between the hours of six and seven o'clock on Thursday evening, about one hundred men broke the house of Mr. Harding, in Newtown, the door and windows of which they were broken.

One of the party threw some vitriol into the face of a nailor in the employment of Mr. Harding, of the name of Hackett, which burned nearly blinded him. His hat has also been broken by the vitriol. This outrage arose from a system of Combination so prevalent in this City at present.

On the same day a party of men attacked the house of a nailor named Joab Pritchard, situate in Newswick-street. They beat Pritchard in a cruel manner, and also assaulted his wife and children.

Four nailors have been lodged in Newgate for their combination.

Forged Bills on the names of Messrs. Orr & Co. and Nicholas Mahon, Esq. were attempted to be passed at a Banking house in this City last week, to the amount of £723.

The price of the quarter loaf has been reduced every week since the coming into office of our excellent Chief Magistrate.

The Revenue of the port of Galway increases annually; the quarter ending the 10th instant, was three times in amount what it was a very few years back.

The Kilkenny Bible Society held its twelfth meeting on Thursday, Lord Ormonde in the chair.—The resolutions submitted were supported in speeches by Messrs. Hamilton, Singer, Ver, Shaw, and Pope—they were opposed by Messrs. Dunphy and Sherman, R. C. C. and Messrs. Irwin and Leech.

This morning, a melancholy accident occurred at the Cathedral; a young boy, named Lalor, about ten years of age, went up on the loft with others, to ring the church bell for the early service, when he unfortunately happened to tread on the trap-door, but it was fastened, which instantly gave way, and he was precipitated from a height nearly fifty feet on the flagged pavement of the aisle. He was conveyed to the Infirmary, where he survived only a few hours.

Last night a fine boy named Meade, was killed in Barrack-street, by a large tierce falling on him from off a car.

Roger Ryan, the poor man who was burned a few days ago in a spirit receiver, which ignited, died in the County Infirmary on Sunday, after enduring the most excruciating agony. The Mayor held an Inquest, and the Jury returned a verdict "accidental death."

In consequence of information received by the Magistrates of Newcastle, that it was intended to create one of those riots which have of late occurred at the fairs of Abbeyfeale and Purt, in this County, at the latter place, on Wednesday last, the Rev. E. Geratty, accompanied by Lieutenant Percy, and a party of mounted Police, from Newcastle, proceeded to Abbeyfeale, where they were reinforced by Captain Gainor and a strong party of the 61st Regiment, whence they went to the fair of Purt, where every precaution was taken to prevent a violation of the peace, and to protect the industrious farmer in transacting his business, which he is generally obliged to relinquish when the battle commences. Owing to the exertions of these Gentlemen, the peace of the fair remained uninterrupted during the day, and at sun-set the tents were all struck by order of the Rev. E. Geratty.

A man was killed at Oulagh, in this County, last night, in a dispute about lands.

John Maher of Ballylarsna, County Carlow, who murdered Thomas Salter there a few nights ago, has absconded.

On Monday, William Haslam, distraining for rent, was assaulted near Cappagh.

On Saturday Major Wilson, T. M. Wilson, and T. P. Vokes, Magistrates of this County, proceeded with Thomas Gabbett, Esq. of this City, to his Estate at Ballyvorneen, near Cahircoulish, in the Barony of Clanwilliam, in this County, and remained the entire of that day examining witnesses relative to the absence of John Ryan, of that place, who has been missing since the preceding Tuesday.—The Magistrates are of opinion that Ryan, has been murdered, and that his body has been concealed.—They have caused bills to be posted in that neighbourhood offering rewards for the discovery of the offender, or for the finding of the body of Ryan, if he has been murdered as is supposed.

The house of Daniel M'Inerney, County Clare, was burned on Wednesday night.

Four men apprehended on Thursday, on a charge of the murder of Mr. Hamerton, were discharged from Clonmel Gaol, it appearing that their accuser has sworn falsely.

Several accidents occurred at Tralee races. Thomas Sheehan late of the 62d Regiment; a man named Donovan; and a young lad named Duane, had their skulls fractured and no hopes are entertained of their recovery.

Sir N. Colthurst, Bart. M. P. has arrived in Cork.

A Garrison Court of Enquiry is about to assemble in Dublin, for the purpose of enquiring whether there be sufficient grounds for a Court Martial on the Lieutenant-Colonel of a distinguished Regiment of Dragoons, who, it is alleged, has signed false returns for the military allowance of coals, &c. to an officer's guard, at Newbridge Barracks, when in fact no such guard was mounted. The charge, if substantiated, subjects the offender to dismissal from His Majesty's service.

Major-General Lord Robert F. H. Somerset, K. C. B. Inspecting General of Cavalry, will inspect the 17th Regiment of Light Dragoon Lancers, at Canterbury, on the 27th inst.; and, on the 29th inst. the half-yearly inspection of the 12th Royal Lancers will be made, by the same Officer, at Brighton.
