The Collectors of the Tolls and Customs are to receive as follows, being the rates under the Schedule:—

For every barrel of Wheat, of Twenty Stone, One Half-penny Gateage, and an Ale Quart of Wheat, Toll; or in lieu thereof, at the option of the owner, Three Halfpence.

For every barrel of Barley, of Sixteen Stone, One Half-penny Gateage; and an Ale Quart of Barley, Toll; or in lieu thereof, at the option of the owner, Three Farthings.

For every barrel of Oats of Fourteen Stone, One Half-penny Gateage; and an Ale Quart of Oats, Toll; or in lieu thereof, at the option of the owner, One Halfpenny

Those rates are much under the relative value of each description of Grain, at the present market prices, and considerably less than the charges heretofore made by the Chamber of Commerce while Tenants to the Corporation.

The Corporation have directed that for the present no Toll shall be taken upon Potatoes, though legally entitled to demand it.

Proposals in writing will continue to be received, by the Right Worshipful HENRY WATSON, Esq. Mayor of Limerick, until Monday the 8th day of November next, for the Tolls and Customs of Corn, the Ingate Duties and Customs upon all articles subject thereto, as set forth in the Schedule posted at the Exchange and Corn-Market. The Custom upon Horses, Black Cattle &c. sold in the Markets. The Customs upon all standings, and the Tolls and Customs of St. John's and St. James Fairs, for one year from the 29th of September last.

Also, for the WEIGHING of all kinds of CORN and GRAIN, subject to the fees as set down in the Schedule.
