The Catholics of Waterford and its vicinity are to meet at noon next Thursday, at the Great Chapel, for the purpose of counteracting the Anti-Catholic measures of the Bible Societies.

There was only one man for trial, Michael Fitzgerald, on a charge of absence from Ballinlina, in the Barony of Upper Connelloe, on the night of the 5th of September. Evidence was gone into which failed in proving the prisoner had any certain place of abode, and he was accordingly acquitted by direction of Mr. Blackburne; after which the Court was adjourned to Wednesday, the 12th of January next.

The Special Sessions for the Insurrection Act in the Liberties, were adjourned this day, by Mr. Blackburne, to same period, as no person appeared for trial.

The Insurrection Act is not for the present to be withdrawn from the Baronies of Pubble Brien, Kenry, and Upper Connelloe, nor from the portions of the Liberties under which it is at present in operation.

On Saturday Mr. Blacker held a Sessions under the Insurrection Act at Fermoy. A man named Callaghan was convicted for absence from his dwelling, and three others acquitted.

The body of the unfortunate Ryan who was murdered a few days ago in the neighbourhood of Caherconlish, presented one of the most frightful and appalling spectacles ever witnessed. The bowels were protruded from the body and half burned; the head, legs, and arms shockingly cut and hacked, from the foot to the chest, the intermediate parts were actually half roasted, and in this horrid condition, the body was found in a bog-hole, near the unfortunate man's house enclosed in a sack. We have been furnished with the details of this worse than savage murder as given on the inquest, but as we are unwilling to prejudice the case by a disclosure which might possibly operate to the prejudice of the parties charged with the crime, we for this reason decline inserting them. The wife of the ill-fated victim, and his male and female servants, are amongst the persons apprehended for the murder.

The house of James Archbold, Esq. of Davidstown, County Kildare, was robbed of a vast quantity of plate on Monday night.

Lynch, the guilty associate of Barrett, who received sentence of death at the last Cork Assizes, for a rape on a married woman, has been apprehended in Killarney.

A serjeant and soldier of the 29th Regiment were met by a party of fellows, within a mile of Macroom, last week. Having ascertained, in the first question, the religion of the serjeant, who was of the Established Church, they immediately struck him, and would have taken his life but for the assistance of the soldier, and a person who came up. Two of the fellows are identified, and apprehended.
