**2nd.**—The approach of the British Fleet into the bay—the Queen Charlotte of 110 guns, very conspicuous—the boat with the flag of truce, preceding the fleet under cover of the Severn frigate, the Albion, Superb, Minden, and Granicus.

**3rd.**—The continuation of the British Fleet; the Impregnable, 98 guns; several Frigates and Bomb Vessels.

**4th.**—The remainder of the British fleet—the Dutch squadron of 6 frigates falling into line of battle order as they enter the Bay.

**5th.**—The battle at night with an awful view of the city partly on fire—the Moon's rays darting on the Emperor's fort through immense clouds of smoke—the Algerine Fleet on fire, and the situation of the Minden, Superb, Severn, Leander, Glasgow, Hebrus, Granicus, and six Dutch Frigates.

**6th.**—The daring situation of Lord Exmouth's ship the Queen Charlotte—the Algerine Frigate on fire, drifting from her moorings, floating close past the Queen Charlotte—the Minden, 74 guns—the Gun, Mortar, and Rocket Boats in the Bay—the Impregnable, part of her quarter gallery shot away—Boats with wounded seamen. &c. &c.

**7th.**—The continuation of the City, the battery of the Mole, the Light-house battery, the Fire-ship exploding—Gun, Mortar, and Rocket Boats, &c. Vessels—the Citadel Battery struck with Lightning.

**8th.**—The City in ruins the day after the battle—the ruinous state of the Mole Battery, and the lower part of the City, with the British and Dutch Boats bringing off the Slaves released from Bondage. In this View several interesting Figures are seen in the boats, as also amongst the ruins.

**9th.**—The continuation of the City in ruins, as also the Battery of the Light-house, the Tower of which is rent to pieces—the beach crowded with Algerines seeking their relatives—the Dey standing on the Mole, viewing the ruinous state of his City, surrounded by his Ministers.
