RIVER SHANNON SALMON FISHERY.

WE, the Undersigned, request a MEETING of the Members of the FISHERY ASSOCIATION, and of all Persons interested in the Fishery of the Shannon, at the Commercial Buildings, at one o'clock, on TUESDAY, the 2d November next, to take into consideration the best mode of proceeding so as to afford the necessary protection to the Salmon Fisheries during that portion of the year in which fishing is prohibited by Law, and which commenced on 12th August last.

Our Wheat Market was well supplied this day, but from the great prices demanded by farmers, buying was very slow and prices declined about 1d. per stone from last quotations—Red, 16d. to 19d. per stone; and White, 17d. to 20d. per stone; some Millers gave 1s. 9d. per stone—our farmers are buying for seed, which tends to keep up prices.—Oats, 9d. per stone, current, and a few dealers gave 9½d.—Best Barley, 13d. per stone; inferior so low as 9½d.—Flour, as last, 42s. for Firsts; 34s. for Seconds; and 26s. per bag for Thirds.—Oatmeal, steady at 12s. per cwt.—Potatoes, ditto, 2½d. to 2¾d. per stone.—Pork, scalded, 32s. to 34s. per cwt.; Singed ditto, 38s. per cwt.—Beef, 4d. to 5d. per lb. for very prime.—Mutton, 4d. to 4½d. per lb.—Rapeseed, 24s. per brl. for prime samples—Flax, hand-scutched, 3s 10d to 4s. 4d. per stone; Mill-scutched, 4s. to 4s. 8d. per stone.—Thread, 5d. and 5½d. per bank.—Pound Yarn, 8d. to 9d.—Herrings, 24s. per brl.—Wool, 16s. per stone.—Whiskey, 6s. 8d. per gallon, at Distillery.—White, Picked Feathers, sold at 20s.; Grey, ditto, 13s. per stone—Rough Tallow, 6s. per stone—Hides, 5s. 8d. per stone—Calf-skins, 3d. to 3½d per lb.—Pine Timber, 75s. per ton.—Norway Deals, 12 ft. 3 inch, £32 per hundred; 8 feet ditto, £22.
