The Galway Advertiser states, that the dinner given at Loughrea to Counsellor Guthrie, for his contribution to the Archbishop of Tuam and the Meeting, was attended by 56 persons, among whom were Mr. Kerrigan, tobacco merchant, Mr. Joyce, apothecary, Hugh Colgan, cooper, Larry Fahy, shopkeeper, Denis O'Connell, watchmaker and merchant, one Corne Coughlan, two or three Lynchs, &c. The Chair was occupied by the son of Colonel M'Dermott; Mr. Fitzpatrick acted as croupier, and Messrs. Ridge and A. Lynch appeared also to hold the scales. The same Paper states, that Robert Power called at our office, to say, "I regretted seeing his name in our columns; he did not go to the Meeting with any intention of speaking, but was merely passing through on his way to Galway, when he met the Editor of the *Connaught Journal*, who invited him to go to the meeting, without letting him know that it was a meeting of the Members of the Bible Society, and offered to give him a ride if it was over, to Galway.—Thus it is evident that the opposition was a got-up thing, and that every man of any respectability is to be regarded as having been trepanned."

Several men, convicted of rioting at the fair at Arney, County Fermanagh, have been sentenced to seven months imprisonment. The Duke of Leinster has given £100 to purchase fuel for the poor of Maynooth, during the winter season.

Twenty-three pawn-brokers were yesterday summoned to the Head Police-office, for breaches of the Act.

The Society of Friends has absconded, and is charged with forgery.

The Insolvent Court, on Friday, James O'Duffy was remanded for eight months, and John Duffy for four. The petition of James O'Duffy of Greybridge, County Limerick, for a discharge, debts are £257 6s. 2d. is to be heard on Monday.

Sunday, the Mayor held an inquest on the body of Jeremiah Armsteade, an aged pensioner of Hall's Alms-house, who died in a shop in Patrick-street the evening previous, whilst eating some bread—verdict 'died by the visitation of God.'

A sail-boat, coming up the river on Sunday, with a cargo of live pigs, was near being lost by the violence of the weather—the crew ran her ashore at this side of Loughill, and they, with the greater part of the cargo, were saved.

A fine young boy was attacked by a dog on Monday morning, and much lacerated. Notwithstanding the vigilance used by the Police, accidents of this kind are very common.

Sunday, a man named Hourigan, living near Mount-Shannon, in a fit of temporary derangement, attempted to commit suicide, by suspending himself with a rope from a beam in his house. He was fortunately detected in time, and restored to animation.

Mr. Blacker presided at a Sessions under the Insurrection Act at Nenagh on Monday last.

On Wednesday morning, about the hour of two o'clock, as Mr. William Parkinson, officer of Excise, Cork, was returning to his house in Dunbar-street, from Messrs Walker and Wise's distilleries, where he had been on duty, he was attacked by four fellows, who rushed from a lane on Sullivan's quay, and made several blows at him, which he fortunately warded off and stabbed one of the ruffians in the cheek with a sword cane, after which, he fired at another and missed him. This unexpected reception induced them to decamp speedily.

The fair of Nenagh, on Monday, was as usual well supplied with stock, and a number of buyers attended—young and store cattle in good demand; fat cattle dull; sheep in general looking up, and bought with avidity; two year old wethers and ewes brought from 35s to 40s; fat pigs in abundance but few buyers: the few that were sold brought 40s per cwt. but in consequence of the fair of Thurles falling on Tuesday, the Clonmel and Waterford buyers did not attend, which may be stated as a reason.

Slaughtering of black cattle commenced here yesterday. Thirty-one bullocks, the property of Robert Kean, Esq. of Ennis—53, the property of John M'Mahon, Esq. of Knockane—45, the property of Colonel Monsell—and 27, the property of Thomas Pilkington, Esq. were this day delivered at the Merchants' stores; the prices are not ascertained, but may be rated nearly the same as those of Cork, which are 22s. per cwt. for Navy, 25s. for India, and 27s. for Planters. No price fixed for Ox hides, but Tallow rates at 6s. per stone. There has not, as yet, any cattle been sent from hence to Cork, and the feeders in this part of the Country prefer slaughtering in Limerick, if the prices encourage them to do so; but the Merchants will not name a price for some time, though they are willing to receive the beef.

Sir Edward Denny has intended not to interfere with the election, for M. P. in the County. Lord Brandon has composed with the parishioners of £500 a-year, as has also the parishes of Caher, Kilmahalik, and Cloherbrien. A few parishes in the County have not availed themselves of the salutary Act.

On Thursday last, an agreement was entered into, by the Mayor, with Bindon Scott, Esq. Wm. Hadlock, for the sale of the Improprate and Vicarial Tithes, £300 to Mr. Scott, and £100 as Vicar.

Last week, Mr. Nimmo has commenced a new village in the County.

The Grand Jury tax, for this cess, is fixed at 2s. 7d.

A Copper Mine has been discovered on Blake Foster's estate in the County, and promises to yield ore of a quality inferior to the celebrated North Wales.

The Foundling Hospital has been closed against the admission of children from the country parts of Ireland, from November, to the 1st of January.
