The Asia Convict ship has sailed from Cove

Police Constables found guilty of manslaughter
at the Spring Assizes of Maryborough.

On Sunday evening five convicts who had
formed a conspiracy to murder the Turnkeys,
and effect their escape from the City Cork Jail,
proceeded to the accomplishment of their de-
signs, but were fortunately overpowered by the
prompt and efficient exertions of the Governor,
and his assistants.

A young man named Cornelius M'Gonikle, in
the employment of a grocer, in Patrick-street,
was killed yesterday by a large hogshead falling
on him. He rashly undertook to roll it into a
cellar, when his foot slipped, and the cask went
over his body. Surgical aid was instantly called
in, but every exertion was ineffectual, and he
died in a few minutes.

A labouring man, named John Dungan, was
admitted on Monday to the County Infirmary,
having his face dreadfully burnt from an unex-
pected explosion of powder, used in blasting
stones at the new Gas works, near Meade's
Quay.

David Jenkin, a sailor, from Cardigan, was
drowned at Waterford on Wednesday night.

Monday morning about half-past 10 o'clock,
a fire broke out in an upper room of the house in
Patrick-street, late the Munster Hotel, Cork,
it was caused by the flue having burst and some
ignited soot falling amongst mattresses in the
apartment. The Royal Exchange and Atlas
fire engines were promptly on the spot, and
speedily extinguished the fire.
